Owing to the early hour and the promptness with which the very efficient fire brigade arrived on the scene the damage was slight, the household effects being all removed. The loss will be about covered by insurance.

Fish have been taken through the ice in large quantities at Long Point bay, Port Rowan, during the past winter. One fisherman from St. Williams took 400 lbs. in one day recently.

A Fast Run.—The Vanderbilt party were returning from the West on Friday and made a remarkable fast run on the Michigan Central between Windsor, and St. Thomas. The train consisted of two special Wagner cars, a baggage car, engine and tender. The distance, 112 miles, was covered in 119 minutes, with a stop eight minutes for water, thus making the actual running time for the 112 miles 111 minutes. The train was under a velocity of 70 miles an hour at times. The officials were well pleased with the time made.

An important item in the construction of the railroad tunnel at Port Huron has arrived there. It is called a tunnel shield, being 21 feet six inches in external diameter and 15 feet 3 inches in length. It is made of heavy plate with water-tight bulkheads, braced internally sufficiently to stand the pressure of twenty-four hydraulic rams, which are used for motive power. The plan is to push this shield ahead until a similar shield is met from the Canadian side, when the bulkhead, braces, etc., will be torn out and the shield abandoned. It is valued at \$9,167,600, and a duty of \$2,634.35 is imposed.

An arbitration suit has been in progress in Simcoe for several weeks between the South Norfolk Railway Company and Messrs. A. W. Smith and D. R. Marr, arising out of a claim for damages put forward by these gentlemen for lands taken for right of way by the railway from their farms. After hearing all the evidence, the arbitrators spent eight hours in discussion and then awarded Smith \$918.75. The company's offer was \$725. Marr was awarded \$170. This sum was also in excess of the company's offer; hence the company will have to pay costs in both cases. These cases have been closely watched, as several others are likely to arise of a similar nature.
