Rev. Jos. Odery, Methodist minister at St. George, was badly injured by his vicious horse Monday night.

Thomas Welsh, aged over 80, was killed by a Grand Trunk train at a crossing in Stratford Monday.

Mrs. Bridget Hanrahan, a native of Ireland, died at Peabody, Mass., Sunday, aged 103 years and 3 mos.

The funeral of the late Jonathan Martin, a victim of the St. George disaster, took place in Woodstock Monday.

Reports of the North-west Indians show that their condition is more favorable than ever before. The industrial schools are a great success.

Commissioner Combs has returned to Montreal from Newfoundland and gives a glowing account of Salvation Army work there.

Charles Fow, clerk for Sing Kee, a Chinese merchant of Chicago, has disappeared with his employer's savings. Chas is supposed to have gone to Canada.

A young man named Fraser had a narrow escape from drowning while crossing from Sydney to Sarawak, near Presqu Isle, on Saturday on the ice, which gave way. He was rescued by two Sarawak farmers who heard his cries.

County Council.

The County Council met on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. The first business transacted was the election of a Clerk in place of the late E. S. Stevenson. The candidates were Messrs W. D. Swayze, of Dunnville, and C. W. Colter, of Cayuga, the latter being elected. The York bridge matter was discussed at considerable length on Wednesday, the Council being addressed by Mr. J. R. Martin, John Leun, Rev. W. F. Sifton, A. Williamson, John Weir and A. A. Davis. A resolution moved by Mr. Hull, seconded by Mr. Murray, to proceed with the work was voted down, only six voting in favor of it. The application of Mr. Jno Taylor, Police Magistrate of Dunnville, for a salary, was also voted down. The contract for the country printing was awarded to Messrs White and Weatherby, of Dunnville. The Council adjourned to meet again on the 18th day of June.

Two Jap Girls Carve Each Other.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 21. - A brutal fight occurred Tuesday night in a suburban sporting place between two Japanese girls who had quarrelled. The girls seized short Japanese swords and attacked each other. Each proved skillful in the use of the weapon, and both were soon dripping with blood from numerous cuts. The affair would have ended in the death of one, if not both, had not clash of steel attracted a policeman, who entered the place. Neither girls received mortal wounds, but both were slashed all over the upper parts of their bodies.

WELLAND, Ont., March 25. - About 2 o'clock to-day the body of Peter Day-boll, was found in the roadway at Welland. It is supposed he was intoxicated and attempted to cross on the ice, which unfortunately gave way and the poor man was drowned. He leaves a large family of children, partly grown up.

A young woman of Dresden, named Emily Steel, aged 17 years, died a short time ago from a peculiar disease. On the Sunday previous to her death she commenced sneezing, and although nothing was thought of it at first, it continued, and on Monday a physician was called in. Nothing could be done, however, to check it, until the following Saturday, when sleep overcame the malady, in which state she soon became unconscious and died Sunday morning.

A few days since a young son of Henry Johnson, living two miles north of Courtland, rode a horse to water without a bridle. When on the road it stumbled, throwing the lad over its head and falling crushed him to death. The horse it seems, was unable to rise through some stiffness in its forelegs, and when found by the father a short time after was still lying upon his side from the poor boy having died.

A servant girl working for Mr. Archibald Wilson, grocer, on the corner of King and James streets, fell out of a second story window at two o'clock this afternoon and sustained probably fatal injuries. She was engaged in cleaning the second story windows on the James st. side and was standing on a table inside the window, and had the upper sash down. She was leaning out over it, and the chair must have slipped, causing her to lose her balance and plunge out over the lower half of the window, head foremost to the paved sidewalk below, striking heavily on her head. A number of bystanders witnessed her fall and rushed over. The girl was unconscious, and at this writing is still in an insensible condition. She was carried into the house and medical aid summoned, but her injuries will probably prove fatal. - Star, St. Catharines.

Happily it has been some time since the cry of fire was heard in our village until Friday night last, when that most startling of all cries rang along the streets at about eleven o'clock. The occasion serves to show the efficiency and the promptness of our fire brigade. Their readiness and earnest devotion to their work was so manifested that night that it ought to effectually silence those rascals who by word and act scorned the brigade and its appliances. We were fortunate enough to be on the spot when the alarm was sounded, and inside of ten minutes, through the roads were knee deep, the engine was playing on the fire and doing excellent work, resulting in the extinguishment of the flames. The structure in which the fire started was the engine house of Heaton Bros. saw mill and planing factory. Had the fire got under way the loss would undoubtedly have been great for apart from the character of the building the place was surrounded by most inflammable material, but the boys by their prompt and strenuous efforts suppressed the danger which threatened that quarter of the town. They deserve our thanks and material recognition. Mr. Heaton very generously acknowledged their usefulness in a substantial way. - Advocate Cayuga.
