Three stores at Meaford were burned Sunday night. Loss \$3,300.

An engine was badly wrecked on the C. P. R. Wednesday, near London.

Campbellford will replace its burned school-house with a \$5,000 building.

Mr. H. C. Kennedy, editor and proprietor of the Morrisburg Courier, is dead.

Jules Khronet, one of the world's greatest clarinetists, died at Montreal Wednesday night.

Robert Spiers was thrown from his buggy and killed at Cooksville last night.

Mrs. Robt. Throsby committed suicide at Montreal yesterday while temporarily insane.

Demott & Durant, a prominent New York stock brokerage firm, assigned on Wednesday.

Princess Irene, wife of Prince Henry of Prussia, brother of the Emperor, has been delivered of a son.

Half the business portion of the Village of Belfax, Ill., was burned Tuesday. Loss, \$30,000.

The Hamilton Presbytery is still whacking away at Sunday traffic on the Welland canal.

A ten-year-old boy named Gilbert, of Talbotville, was severely bitten by a dog yesterday.

The charge of seduction against T. Hodge, of Kingston, has been dismissed for want of evidence.

Reports from Newfoundland say that the seal catch this season already exceeds last year's entire take.

The German bark Johanne Auguste, from Moodyville, has been lost. Her crew have arrived at Valparaiso.

The editor of a Charlottentown paper has been sentenced to three months' imprisonment for libelling Bismarck.

John McLeod, a married man, was fined \$25 and costs at Niagara Falls Wednesday for an attempt at indecent assault.

Miss Stephenson, the principal of the Brantford school, who whipped the janitor, yesterday paid a fine of \$2 and costs.

It is believed that A. D. Smith, who committed suicide at Belleville, did so from remorse at having betrayed a woman.

Sir Thomas Gladstone, B. rt., is dead. Sir Thomas, who was the only surviving brother of William E. Gladstone, was born July 25, 1804.

Last evening a thief entered the residence of Lieut. A. B. Tyler at Washington and stole \$2,000 worth of jewelry. The family were at dinner.

The Norwegian bark Orvar Odd, from Brunswick, Ga., for Buenos Ayres, has been abandoned at sea. Her crew have arrived at St. Michael's.

The members of the Atchafalaf expedition who were brought to Sebastopol have been allowed to return to their homes. Atchafalaf is detained.

Vienna Liberals are dismayed at the success of the anti-Semites in the municipal elections. They accuse the clerical of assisting the anti-Semites.

King Alexander has requested his mother, ex-Queen Natilie, to remain in absent from Serbia, as her presence would render his position a difficult one.

Kingston is angry because somebody unknown inserted a clause in the railway bill giving the Kingston and Prescott road power to haul Napanee, Tawarworth and Quebec trains.

An indignation meeting in London Wednesday night protested against the closing of a school by the Board of Health. It was also decided to ask the Ontario Government to appoint a commission of inquiry into the financial condition of the village.

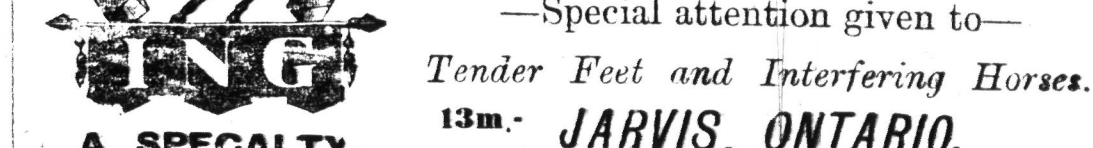
