RAILWAY CONSOLIDATION.—At the meeting of shareholders of the South Norfolk railway and of the Georgian Bay division of the Grand Trunk held at Simcoe on Monday, it was unanimously resolved to incorporate the South Norfolk extension into the Georgian Bay division under the special provision of an Act of the Dominion Parliament session of 1888. All the necessary resolutions were passed and agreements unanimously approved for the consolidation.

How to make the Hair Grow.

TO EDITOR SCIENTIFIC AMERICAN: Experience has taught me that it is best to keep all oils or grease from the hair. Don't let barbers oil it. I find wetting with water best. At least once a week rub the yolk of an egg or half of it, well into the hair and scalp, and rinse off thoroughly with tepid water. It will promote growth and color, probably largely due to the sulphur in the egg. This course has started a new growth of hair with me, not very thick, but better than none at all. A.
