Hon. Daniel Harrington died at Shediac, N.B., Sunday, aged 85.

A demonstration in honor of the French centenary was in Athens.

Chief of Police Redden, of Rat Portage, has not yet been captured.

Four thousand miners in Brazil, Ind., district have gone back to work.

Eight thousand emigrants left Liverpool last week; 1,333 came to Canada.

The French revolution of 1789 was commemorated in France Saturday.

Reports indicate that the English Sugar Bounties Bill is practically killed.

The release of William O'Brien and Timothy Harrington has been ordered.

Melvin C. Garlitz, accused of wife murder, has been found guilty at Cumberland, Md.

Hamilton Board of Trade is moving in the matter of a summer carnival in August next.

Thirty-five of the seventy lathers in Rochester have struck for an advance in wages.

The winners in the American Association Monday were Cincinnati and St. Louis.

Thirty persons engaged in selling a Socialist's pamphlet at Hamburg have been arrested.

Hog cholera is again reported to have broken out in Tilbury West, county of Essex.

The Dublin Telegraph says Wm. O'Brien has been unconditionally released from prison.

The population of Quebec is placed at 69,705, or with St. Sauveur included, 85,000.

Lotta, the actress, was severely injured by a fall on the stage at Easton, Pa., on Friday night.

Director Heusch, of the Comptoir d'Escompte, has been admitted to bail in \$200,000.

The guns of the U.S. cruiser Chicago were tested at sea on Friday and worked satisfactorily.

The American Duchess of Marlborough was presented at the Queen's drawing room on Friday.

A mad dog panic is raging at Bay City, Mich., where 35 dogs have been killed in the last 24 hours.

The National League winners Monday were New York, Cleveland, Pittsburg and Boston.

Mrs. Mary Nolan, a native of Ireland, has just died at Glen Cove, L.I., aged 104 years and 9 months.

The man Perrin, who fired at President Carnot on Sunday, has been treated for insanity, due to a fever.

A convention of Reformers is to be held at Uxbridge on the 29th inst., to nominate a candidate for the local election contest.

The National Baseball League winners Thursday were: Brooklyn, Baltimore, St. Louis and Kansas City.

Secretary Blaine maintains the improvement in health which has manifested itself within the last few days.

Harris' rolling mills, which were burnt down in St. John, N.B., seven weeks ago, are again in full operation.

The carpenters in the planing mills and factories of Windsor have struck for a ten per cent. advance on wages.

At Lafayette, La., Monday an armed mob prevented negroes from voting at a municipal election, and the officials closed the polls.

Monday afternoon at 3.30 the bodies of the unidentified victims of the Hamilton disaster will be interred by the G.T.R. Company and citizens.

Mr. Erastus Wimen delivered his stereotyped speech on trade relation in Brantford last night, and was keenly criticised by Mr. Robert Henry.

At Eaton, Ohio, Elmer L. Sharkey aged 22, has been convicted of murder in the first degree for killing his mother.

Sir Charles Russel will arbitrate the question between the landlord and the tenants on the Vandeleur estates on Saturday.

Mr. John Dillon addressed an Irish meeting at Melbourne, Australia, on Tuesday at which \$5,000 was subscribed for the Irish cause.

The United States Senate Committee on Trade Relations with Canada have left Chicago for San Francisco, where investigations will begin in earnest.

The Paris Exposition was opened on Monday.

At Nashville, Tenn., Thursday Cometo-Taw won the great Two Thousand dollar rice, his stable companion, Proctor Knott, being pulled to allow him to do so.

The President has granted a respite until May 17 in the case of Nelson Colbert, who was to have been hanged at Washington to-day for the murder of Philip Wentzell.

F. H. Ogle, lately of Oshawa, was shot in the street in Salem, Oregon, last evening, and probably fatally wounded. W. E. Hawkins was arrested for the deed.

The bodies of Henry E. Jeffrey, Robert Little and James P. Anderson, who were drowned a few days ago by the upsetting of their boat near Midland, have been recovered.

In the International Association baseball games Thursday Syracuse beat Buffalo and Toledo defeated London, the other games to have been played being postponed on account of rain.

The miners of Illinois in convention at Streator have refused to accept a reduction of ten cents per ton, and the machine men and laborers have gone out pending a settlement of the difficulties.

Two men entered W. B. Marsh's jewellery store, Boston, Wednesday night, and while being shown some diamond pins, one of the men grabbed a pin worth \$250 and fled. The proprietor ran after him, and the other man secured \$500 worth of jewellery and left. Both are still at large.
