Parliament prorogued Dominion

One hundred barrels of salt were seized at Kingston on Thursday by the Inspector of Weights and Measures. Every barrel was found to be from 20 its. to 40 ibs. short in weight.

A Washington despatch says it is not improbable that Canadian freight cars coming into the United States railroads will have to pay the regular rate of duty at points of entry.

Five hundred thousand bushels of corn were despatched Monday from Toledo to England. It went by lake and canal to Kingston, thence by rail to New York, This is one of the largest shipments of grain ever made from Toledo. It filled eleven boats which left altogether.


