Michael Read was killed by lightning Troy, N.Y., on Friday.
M. Poirier, an Opportunist, has been elected senator in the Department of the Seine.

Mr. E. D. Sherwood, late deputy sheriff, of Carleton county, has suicided by shooting.

There was quite a fall of snow in the northern part of Colorado on Thursday night.

John O. Wood, the Toronto druggist charged with murder, has been admitted to bail.

Dr. Herman Lockstaedt, manager of the Butchers' Exchange in New York, has become insane.

The annual meeting of the Canadian Imperial Federation League was held in Hamilton on Saturday.

Rev. J. P. Lewis, rector of Grace church, Toronto, denounced commercial union from his pulpit Sunday.

M. Durnovo, Director of Charities, will succeed the late Count Tolstoi as Minister of the Interior in Russia.

The new United States cruiser Charleston made a successful trial trip from Santa Barbara, Cal., on Friday.

The corner stone of St John's church West Toronto Junction, was laid on Saturday by Rev. Dr. Sheraton.

John Jarret, of Pittsburg, is mentioned as the successor of Benjamin Folsom as U. S. consul at Sheffield, England.

Captain Murrell, of the Missouri, is to be feted at Cardiff, where he lives. The town council is moving in the matter.

The British steamer Aberlady is ashore near Cape Lookout, N.C., with her propeller gone. Tugs have gone to her assistance.

A gunner named Herbert Skinner, of the British Marine Artillery, has had a windfall of \$2,650,000 and a large droptery in Hereford.

Patrick Ford, a watchman in Armour's packing factory at Chicago, shot his 23 year old wife and then suicided on Saturday.

The London police Sunday morning raided the Field and Adelphi clubs, capturing a number of noblemen who were gambling for large sums.

Mrs. McGahen, wife of the Baptist minister at Johnson's Creek, N.Y., was burned to death the other day through an overflow of gasoline from a stove.

Irving Latimer, who was convicted at Jackson, Mich., of murdering his mother, has been sentenced to life imprisonment. The case is to be appealed.

The French Government announces that visitors to Paris during the exhibition will be required to pay only one-half the regular rates on dutiable goods.

Ex-Banker James D. Fish passed through Utica on Saturday en route to New York. He looked with fiery eyes at the reporters who wished to interview him and would not talk.

The Government of Italy refuses to surrender the two Italians charged with being implicated in the murder of Paymaster McClue and his assistant, Flanagan, in Pennsylvania.

The bodies buried in Hamilton supposed to be Mrs. Smith and her daughter, of San Francisco, turn out not to have been such, as reports of their safety have been received. A Mrs. Smith and daughter, of Akron, Ohio, are now reported to have been the victims.

George Meyers was drowned at Barrie Sunday. He was out rowing with two companions named Price and Johnson, and an attempt to change seats resulted in the boat being upset. Parties who saw the accident rescued Price and Johnson from the overturned boat.

A Tuscon, Arizona, despatch says that Major J. W. Wham and his escort of twelve soldiers were robbed of \$29,000 on Saturday in a gorge near Cedar Springs. The money was to pay the soldiers at Fort Thomas. Eight of the escort was wounded before the cash was handed over.

On the night of April 29th ult., Louis Loucks, aged 23, was lost overboard in Lake Erie from the schooner Aleha, in tow of the barge Alpena bound for Tonawanda. The accident occurred in mid-lake abreast of Dunkirk, N. Y. The parents of the unfortunate young man take this method of calling the attention of vessel men, life saving crews, and others to keep a sharp lookout for the body, and if same be found, to at once telegraph his father, J. W. Loucks, Cheboygan, Michigan, who will pay a liberal reward for its recovery. Deceased at the time of the accident wore a double-breasted, blue chinchilla coat, dark pants, Scotch cap and laced shoes. Height about 5 feet 7 inches; weight about 155 pounds; brown hair, clipped close; hazel eyes; smooth face; no marks on body, except small scar on forehead. Might have had a printer's composing rule in his pocket. A GREAT CONVENIENCE FOR TRAMPS. - Nearly every hotel in the city is now supplied with a fire escape, and while the landlords have been trying to devise some easy method for guests to get out of their houses in case of fire the wily tramp has been puzzling his brain as to how he could get in.
