REFRESHING COOLNESS.

**A Pittsburg Lunatic Dumped
into Hamilton.**

THE PITTSBURG AUTHORITIES THINK
CANADA SHOULD SUPPORT HIM BE-
CAUSE HE IS A BRITISH SUBJECT—
CHIEF MCKINNON OBJECTS.

Yesterday afternoon a slight young man with a black moustache arrived on the train from the east with a crazy individual named Phillip Connolly, whom he had brought all the way from Pittsburg, Pa., with the cool intention of foisting him upon the corporation of Hamilton. When he arrived here the young man had the patrol wagon summoned to take the lunatic up and place him in charge of the police, but Chief McKinnon naturally objected, and made the young man rapidly understand that he would have to take Connolly back.

George Pearson, the young man referred to, is the messenger of the city of Pittsburg and is simply acting under instructions from his superiors. The following are the facts on which the solution of that barge based the process of reasoning by which they evolved the brilliant scheme of shipping the unfortunate lunatic over the border. Phillip Connolly says that he was born in Ireland and some years ago removed to Scotland. From there he sailed on the Allan line to Halifax and came on to Toronto. After remaining there a short time he came to Hamilton and went out to work on a farm near Stony Creek, where he remained several weeks, but had a dispute with the farmer and left for Buffalo, buying a ticket at Winona or some outlying station. At Buffalo he stole a ride to Pittsburg, and on arriving there got work at his trade as a puddler in one of the iron works. On March 4 Squire McKenna had Phillip before him on a charge of vagrancy and committed his compatriot to the workhouse for ten days. During this period the inspectors found that Connolly had become insane. He said he was a British subject, and the intelligent guardians immediately reasoned that Canada was a dependency of Britain; in fact, it was Britain; then why not return the demented unfortunate to the shelter of his flag? No sooner was it determined upon than it was executed. Poor Connolly was placed in charge of Pearson, and was brought to Niagara Falls, where he attempted to lose the lunatic; but Connolly stuck to him, and the customs authorities, getting wind of the affair, informed Pearson he must leave his charge there. Then the representative of Pittsburg came on to Hamilton with the result above mentioned.

Chief McKinnon took Pearson to Hon. Mr. Roberts, United States consul, and as a result of the conference, Pearson telegraphed to R. E. Elliott, chief of the department of charities in Pittsburg, conveying to that functionary the startling intelligence that Hamilton's authorities refuse to have other people's lunatics shouldered off on them like that. Pearson says the city of Pittsburg has a rule that when these unfortunates turn up who are not American citizens they are shipped off to the last place of departure.

In contrast to this may be mentioned the case of the crazy girl, Nancy Scruggs, who came here several months ago from Virginia, and has been well taken care of ever since. Her friends are too poor to send for her, and the authorities of the place where she came from show no symptoms of wanting to take the poor girl off the hands of the Hamilton police.—Spectator.

The Centennial.

The Americans had a gay time last week in New York celebrating Washington's Centennial. Neither labor nor expense was spared in order to make the affair a success, and successful it was so far as the speeches and displays of every kind were concerned, but, like many a similar ceremony, firewater caused it to terminate disgracefully. After the speeches and marching were ended a grand ball was held to give eclat to the proceedings. This was followed by a supper at which champagne followed like water till many became gloriously drunk and conducted themselves like animals in a menagerie. The New York World describes the closing scenes thus:

"The excellent supper was largely wasted. There was no responsibility for anything to anybody. The 'gentleman's dining-room' idea was shown to be an utter fallacy. 12:30 p.m. the supper room had been given over to people whose ideas of enjoyment had been learned in free-and-easy resorts. Drunken men invaded the ballroom, flourishing bubbling bottles of champagne. In the corridors free fights were of constant occurrence. Gamblers, book-makers and women dozed or made merry on the staircases. Never once did an accredited officer of the evening interfere to anybody's knowledge. The policemen who were sober were helpless. They couldn't tell the dress-coated waiters from the guests.

By 1 o'clock most of the respectable element were making frantic and superfluous efforts to get away. A line extending from the coat-rooms for 500 yards and made up of some of the leading citizens of this town surged for hours against the feeble and inadequate partitions of the coat-room. Gentlemen grew angry and desperate at the utter inadequacy of the arrangements. With torn coats and wrinkled shirt fronts men whose names are known all over the Union fought their way towards their coats under the frequent clubs of the police, the jeers of the mob outside and the pernicious activity of the pickpockets. It was 5 o'clock in the morning before the last battered and ragged guest joined his family at the doors and reached his hack. The truth is, there never was a big affair so besridden by pigmies, and now that they have strutted and fretted their brief hour let them be forgotten.

A Cow's Strange Offspring.

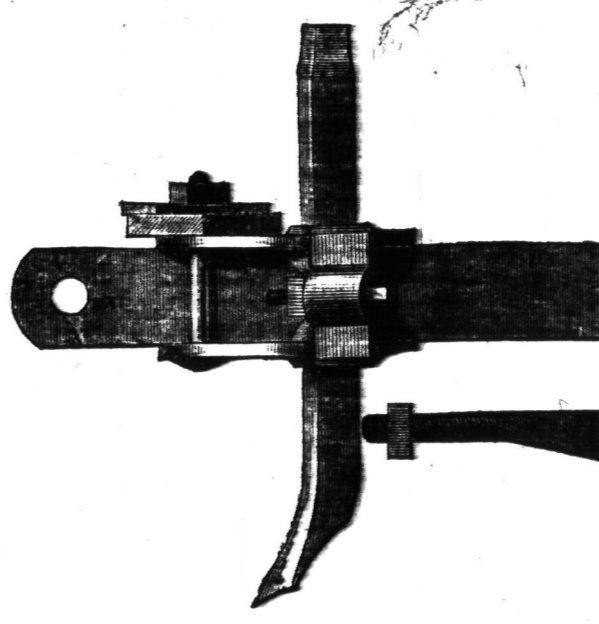
A very remarkable freak of nature, briefly referred to in the Star the other day, exists on the farm of J. H. Carter, concession 8, lot 20, township of Simcoe, Bond Head P. O. On Sunday, April 14, a cow belonging to Carter gave birth to two lambs and a calf. He is a respectable farmer, who would not under any circumstances be guilty of an attempt to palm off a fraud on the public, and the issue has been seen by scores of his neighbors. The attendant circumstances were such as to leave no shadow of doubt on his mind as to the correctness of the statement. The lambs are to all appearance perfect, but larger than ordinary. The calf, a male, is also perfect. The expression in the face of the lambs has a peculiarity, while considerable hair is mixed among the wool, both in the fleece and on the legs. Mr. Carter has already refused an offer of \$600 for the dam and family. Ed. Jeff, lecturer on agriculture for Ontario, and many other gentlemen have been visitors. So far as it is known there is no parallel case on record.—St. Catharines Star.

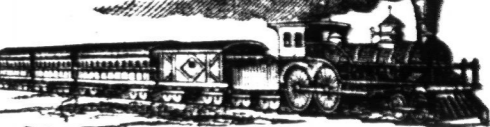

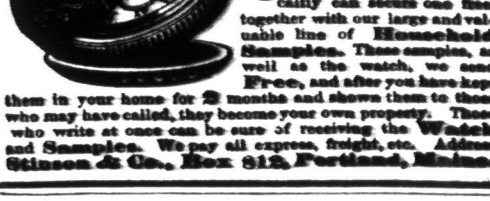
