Three children of W. Sovereign, of Windham, were seriously poisoned on Saturday week by eating toadstools in mistake for mushrooms.

On Wednesday a little child of John Mitchell's, Scotch Line, drank a quantity of lye, but under the treatment of Dr. Bennett is around all right again.

Charles Mitz, of Buffalo, and N. E. Reichheld, of the Dominion Hotel, Nelles' Corners, were in town Thursday, buying horses for Buffalo market.

The number of passengers killed on Canadian Railways during the fiscal year 1887-88 was 20; number of employees killed, 107; number of others killed, 104; total killed, 231.

The Act incorporating the Independent Order of Forrester was assented to by the Senate on Thursday week. This is the only secret society that has received letters of incorporation from the Dominion Government.

A warrant was taken out against G. Tiger, who works for Wm. Chambers, for using abusive language to E. A. Lea, to appear before A. Rodgers, J. P., on Monday. The case was settled on Saturday.

It is stated that in several places this spring traces of "black rot" have been found in apple trees. Such being the case it will be well for all fruit growers to have their orchard thoroughly overlooked and all affected branches cut out.

In walking from the barn to the house on Good Friday, during the terrific thunderstorm, Julia Helsdon, daughter of James Helsdon, Courtland, was struck by lightning and rendered unconscious. Though regaining her senses she has remained speechless ever since.

On Thursday while C. Lofthouse was drawing a load of clay, his son, aged 6 years, who was sitting on the front of the wagon, fell off and the wheels passed over him. Dr. Bennett was called, but life departed at 6 o'clock the following morning. The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon to Chenside cemetery.

A very heavy wind and rain storm passed over this section on Friday, doing considerable damage to several barns and scattering fences in general. Wm. Williamson had a shed unroofed and Thos. W. Ivey a barn. The fence surrounding the agricultural grounds was levelled to the ground, and rumor has it that several barns in Rainham were struck by lightning and burned, but we have not heard the particulars.

A circular to postmasters throughout the Dominion, calling attention to the recent Act of Parliament increasing the rate of postage upon registered and drop letters, and requiring postage to be paid upon publications issued less frequently than once a month, will shortly be sent out by the Postmaster General. It is expected that the changes will go into effect on June 1st, though it will take some time to get the new machinery in working order.

SIMCOE, May 11.—About five o'clock this morning the residence of Mr. W. P. Innes, manager of the Simcoe canning factory, was almost totally destroyed by fire, together with the contents. The fire originated in the stables communicating afterwards to the house. Loss about \$1,000; insured for \$2,000.

DUNNVILLE, Ont., May 7.—A party of young men, who had been drinking, started to cross the Grand river in a row boat. When about 200 yards from the island the boat upset. All were saved except a young man named Wm. McConnell, who had gone down before aid arrived. The body has not yet been recovered.

INGERSOLL, Ont., May 7.—Yesterday afternoon a young child belonging to Mr. Kerr, of Centerville, was badly bitten by a vicious dog belonging to a Mr. Cook. The dog attacked the child and lacerated her leg in a frightful manner. Dr. Dickson was called in this morning and stitched up the wound, and although serious fears are entertained of the child's recovery the doctors hope fatal results may be avoided.

Ten thousand nine hundred and fifty dollars was the amount of fines imposed since the Scott Act came into force in Chatham. There were commitments for non-payment of some \$552 of this amount. About \$300 is in process of collection. \$9,703.05 has been handed into the town treasury, of which \$1,466.64 was paid into the License Fund account, leaving a net balance of \$8,236.51.

The action brought by Mr. John Dean of Waterford, against Dr. Rose to recover damages of \$5,000 for the death of his wife, which took place while she was under the influence of chloroform, administered by the Doctor, was tried in Hamilton at the Assizes, before Chief Justice Armour. Mr. Heyd, of Brantford, conducted the case for the plaintiff. Mr. Martin, Q. C., of Hamilton, with Mr. Slaght, appeared for the defendant. The jury failed to agree upon a verdict and were discharged.

AYLMER, Ont., May 12.—At an early hour this morning fire broke out in the mammoth pork packing establishment belonging to the firm of Walker & Marlatt, of this place, and despite the efforts of the fire brigade, who were promptly on the scene, the building and its contents were soon destroyed. The loss upon the building and contents is estimated at \$30,000. Had the fire occurred a few weeks earlier, before the stock had been largely disposed of, the loss would have been much heavier. Messrs. Walker & Marlatt will recover about \$25,000 from several insurance companies. The fire when first discovered had completely enveloped the whole building, and the structure being frame and thoroughly saturated with grease, burnt rapidly. It is supposed that the fire originated in the furnace room, where a fire had been burning during the day. The loss to Aylmer and the surrounding country by this conflagration is very heavy, as one of the town's important industries has been destroyed. The building will probably be rebuilt.

Five Ways to Cure a Cold.
