



After a sojourn there of a few weeks he returned and made arrangements to start a drug store in Buffalo, but unfortunately for him, his arrest will interfere with his wordly prospects. interceding with the Attorney General with a view to his surrender, on condition that a light sentence should be imposed, but it is unnecessary to add that they met with no success. As the charge against Wood is murder, he he refuses to return of his own accord. No steps will be taken for extradition until the prisoner's decision is known, and in meantime he will be held by the Buffalo authorities.


