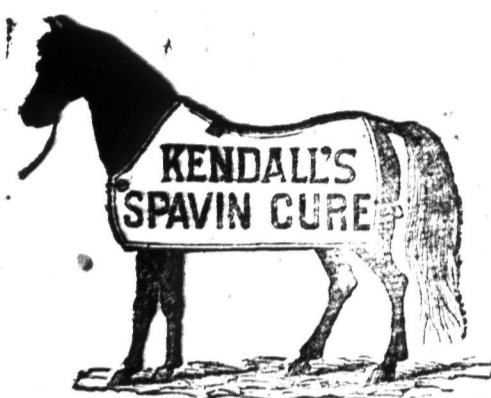

**WALPOLE COUNCIL.**

WALPOLE TOWN HALL, May 14th, 1889.

The council met pursuant to adjournment the members all present.

The minutes of last meeting of council were read and approved.

Moved by Mr. Allen, seconded by Mr. Stonehouse, that the sum of Two hundred dollars be granted to Jarvis streets, one hundred and twenty five to be spent on main street and seventy five on Talbot street.—Lost.

Moved by Mr. Allen, seconded by Mr. Graham, that this Council grant to the Walpole Agricultural Society the sum of one hundred dollars to assist in prizes for the Fall Exhibition.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Allen, seconded by Mr. Stonehouse, that this Council grant the sum of two hundred dollars to be expended on the streets in Jarvis. The money to be expended by Mr. Stonehouse, and Mr. Allen.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Winger, seconded by Mr. Stonehouse, that the Township Engineer be authorized to examine the water course and drainage on the 14th concession opposite Lot Two and report the same.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Allen, seconded by Mr. Graham, the Engineer be authorized to inspect the ditch on Lot 15th Con. 14th opposite Mr. Ham Hinds, and report to this Council.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Winger, seconded by Mr. Stonehouse, that a By Law be introduced for the appointment of Pathmasters for the present year and that the Bill be read a first time.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Winger, seconded by Mr. Allen, that the Bill be read a second time.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Stonehouse, seconded by Mr. Graham, that the By Law be read a third time passed signed and entered as in the original motion.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Allen, seconded by Mr. Stonehouse, that John Graham be appointed a Commissioner to examine Bridge on 9th concession east of Walter Jones and repair or rebuild if necessary.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Allen, seconded by Mr. Winger, that Joseph Stonehouse be appointed to inspect Bridge on first side road opposite Thomas Harris and repair or rebuild if necessary.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Winger, seconded by Mr. Graham, that this Council accept and pay the following accounts:

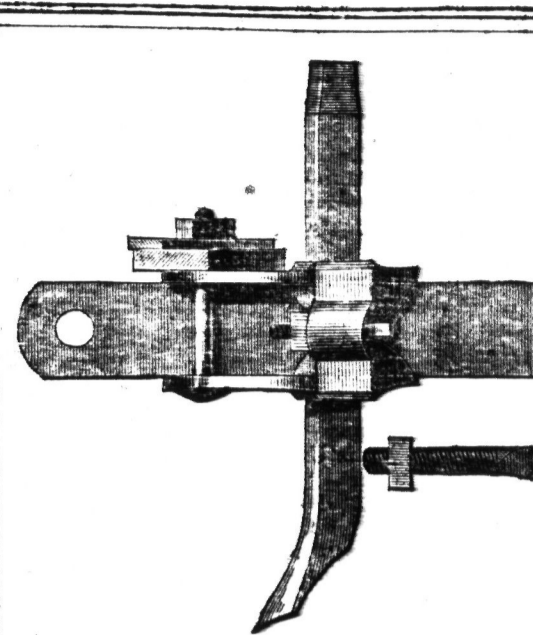

TORONTO, May 9.—John O. Wood, druggist, who was found guilty last December of murder in connection with the Lily Charlton case, was arrested yesterday in Buffalo. When he left Toronto, after his offence had become notorious, Wood located in Buffalo and stopped at the Mansion House. He left, however, the day before the Buffalo authorities were notified that he was wanted, and travelled South as far as Mexico. After a sojourn there of a few weeks he returned and made arrangements to start a drug store in Buffalo, but unfortunately for him, his arrest will interfere with his worldly prospects. It is said that Wood's friends have been interceding with the Attorney General with a view to his surrender, on condition that a light sentence should be imposed, but it is unnecessary to add that they met with no success. As the charge against Wood is murder, he can be extradited under the treaty, if he refuses to return of his own accord. No steps will be taken for extradition until the prisoner's decision is known, and in meantime he will be held by the Buffalo authorities.
