Robert T. Lincoln presented his credentials to the Queen on Saturday at Windsor.

Eleven thousand employed in the building trades of Berlin are on strike.

Four hundred thousand dollars in gold was ordered for export at New York on Saturday.

The Indiana miners' families are said to be suffering from want, and committees are soliciting aid.

Rev. H. G. Schoo, assistant rector of St. Paul's Episcopal church in Baltimore, succumbed by shooting Sunday.

The Valkyrie for the third time defeated her English rival on Saturday. Lord Dunraven, her owner, is delighted.

The United States revenue cutter Rush has sailed from San Francisco to protect American fishing interests in Behring's sea.

The United States ship Yantic was struck by a hurricane on May 21 and badly damaged. She has arrived at New York.

The residence of Albert Bushoe at Attleboro, Mass., was robbed of silverware and jewelry valued at \$1,000 the other night.

Cashier George Jessup of the Scranton, Pa., City Bank, was placed under arrest at the bank on Saturday, charged with embezzling \$135,000.

A retired farmer, formerly of the tenth concession of Peel, was accidentally drowned in the Grand river at Elora on Friday night.

It is reported that the English and American salt combines have reached an agreement which assures harmonious work and full financial support.

John E. Bassett, hardware merchant, has been arrested at New Haven, Conn., charged with abetting embezzlement in connection with Cashier Bradley and Teller Palmer, of the Merchants' National Bank.

Three masked robbers entered an express car on the Texas Pacific railroad on Saturday night, beat the messenger into insensibility, robbed the car of \$1,500, pulled the bell cord, and when the train slowed up jumped off and escaped.

After you have sent in your order and photo you receive another circular from the Company, containing cuts of what appear to be very handsome and costly frames. The necessity of framing your portrait, and the great advantage of ordering your frame from the Co. is referred to in a plausible style that is very apt to accomplish the object desired. The prices of the frames range from \$15 to \$20. When the portrait arrives, which may not happen for several months after giving your order, it on the first appearance looks all right, but on close examination the portrait will be found to be a cheap crayon daub, and the frame a gilded delusion, the whole outfit not being worth five dollars. People who expect something for nothing generally get left, and it is a safe rule to have nothing to do with all schemes of this kind.
