A general epitome of events of the week.  
Princess Beatrice has given birth to a son.  
The City of Paris has cut the ocean record to 54 days 22 hours 10 minutes.  
All the railroad ticket offices in Chicago will close on Sunday after June 2.  
In the Carter divorce case, at Chicago, a verdict has been given for Mr. Carter.  
Three thousand masons have struck in Berlin for shorter hours and higher wages.  
Haytien advices state that Hippolyte's forces have gained several important towns and captured some of Legitime's cannon.  
The Umbria made her last trip from New York to Queenstown in 6 days 3 hours.  
A cyclone at Forestburg, Tex., blew down the schoolhouse and killed two children.  
The funeral of the late Allan Thorn-dyke Rice took place in New York on Saturday.  
Ten English contract laborers landed at New York on Thursday have been sent back.  
The strike at the National Tube Works, McKeesport, Pa., which involved 2,000 men, has been settled.  
R. G. Thomas, editor of the Caseyville Herald, shot and killed Geo. Elmer, a prominent merchant.  
Dhuleep Singh and his English bride have gone to Russia to spend their honeymoon.  
Mr. Parnell will visit Edinburgh July 1, when he will receive the freedom of the city.  
The Shah will remain three days at the winter palace at St. Petersburg and will then go to Paris.  
H. G. Perrine and wife (formerly Mrs. Oscar Folsom), of Buffalo, N. Y., are staying at an hotel in Chicago.  
The late Earl of Malmesbury left a number of manuscripts, with orders not to publish them for several years.  
The body of a man was discovered on the shore of Burlington Beach Wednesday, bearing marks of violence.  
The Western Arms and Cartridge Company, of Chicago, have assigned. Assets, \$110,000; liabilities, \$80,000.  
The will of the late Sir Thomas Gladstone, brother of the ex-Premier, bequeaths an estate valued at \$1,270,395.  
The military tribunal Metz has imposed a fine of 600 marks each upon 37 young men for evading military duty.  
Farrell McCarthy, a Cleveland saloon-keeper, during a drunken quarrel killed Ira Benten, a traveling salesman.  
The Duke of Norfolk heads a public invitation for contributions for a silver jubilee testimonial to Cardinal Manning.  
The Brooklyn Eagle's Washington special reports rather serious disagreements between President Harrison and his Cabinet.  
During the past six months over 100 families have removed from the North-western States and settled in Canadian territory.  
The Western freight agents have decided to reduce the rate on iron ore from lake ports to Pittsburg from \$1.25 to 1.05 per ton.  
The Westphalian mine owners have agreed to reduce the day to eight hours and to advance miners' wages 20 to 30 per cent.  
The freight handlers in the Fitchburg R.R. yards at Boston, all Knights of Labor, have decided to demand increased wages.  
Marks, Dobie & Co. write a strong letter in denial of charges made against them in connection with the recent Algoma troubles.  
There was a good demand for bank shares Tuesday afternoon, and values are on a little higher range. Montreal sold up to 225.  
A clerk who was waiting to make a deposit of some \$3,000 in a Montreal bank Tuesday, had the whole amount stolen from him while his back was turned for a moment.

**The Sea Serpent.**  
CAPT. SMITH SEES HIS NEBS, WHO IS 300 FEET LONG.

PHILADELPHIA, May 14.—Capt. Smith, first officer of the steamer British Princess, which arrived yesterday from Liverpool, reports that on May 4 in latitude 44, longitude 42.40, he saw an enormous sea serpent. It was at day-break, and Smith and the fourth mate were on the bridge at the time. Smith chanced to look astern and saw something in the water one hundred yards away. To the naked eye it appeared as a large black obstacle sticking out of the water in a perpendicular position like a long spar or buoy. Smith seized the glasses to make it more plainly, and saw it was alive. Above the water rose the head and neck of a tremendous monster. The head resembled in size and shape the "top of a beef barrel," as Smith put it. The body, though completely submerged, could be made out plainly by the disturbance of the water around it and 300 feet away from where the head and neck stood out of the water the monster's tail was beating and lashing the sea into foam. Smith turned to send for Capt. Freeth, the Princess' commander, but before he could give the order the sea serpent had disappeared. Smith has hitherto been a disbeliever in serpent stores.
