Buffalo Bill has been supplanted in London by P. T. Barnum.
St. Louis had an earthquake shock on Saturday morning.

The Swiss government has prohibited Salvation Army meetings.
The Locomotive Engineers have refused to adopt articles on federation.

Lindsay was lighted by electricity for the first time on Saturday night.
Mr. James Hunter, for 34 years a resident of Luther township, died on Friday, aged 61.

Twelve German musicians were arrested in New York on Saturday for playing in the streets.
Right Hon. Jas. Whitehead, formerly lord mayor of London, has been made a baronet.

The Hatfields and McCoys in West Virginia have had another battle, in which the McCoys were worsted. Several were slain and a number wounded.

Alexander Simpson, a reporter on the Kansas City Times, has received word from London that he has fallen heir to the estate of his aunt in Edinburgh valued at \$200,000.

The great snowstorm out west has abated but telegraph lines have been broken and thousands of horses and cattle driven off their ranges, hundreds of the weaker animals perishing.

A Bridgeport, Conn., girl, who unknowingly had diphtheria coming on, passed some gum which she was chewing to another little girl, who in turn passed it to two playmates. All four took the disease and two died.

The new railway bridge across the Fifth of Forth, one of the most marvellous pieces of engineering of the century, is shortly to be put to the test of carrying fifty locomotives hitched together and travelling back and forth at varying rates of speed.

While two sons of Mr. John Hu Man, aged 12 and 18 years respectively, were in their father's woods on lot 23 in the 7th con. of Townsend, on Thursday, October 17th, they noticed a boy about 9 years old in the woods. Saturday some fifteen of the neighbors turned out to search but no trace of him could be found, except two or three pieces here and there where he had lain down on the leaves in the woods to sleep. The boy is supposed to have been taken there by his step-mother and a man from Brantford some four or five days before, and being left alone had become wild.

Harvey will Swing.

THE GUELPH MURDERER CONVICTED AND SENTENCED TO THE EXTREME PENALTY.

GUELPH, Ont., Nov. 2.—This morning the court resumed at nine o'clock when Justice Street gave his charge to the jury in the Harvey trial reviewing the evidence for the crown and defense very fully, which occupied nearly two hours, fully explaining what the law was on the question of insanity. The jury retired and after an absence of an hour and a half brought in a verdict of wilful murder, upon which he was sentenced to be hanged on Nov. 29. The condemned man received the sentence in the same calm and unconcerned manner that has marked his actions during the trial. After being sentenced he walked to his cell with the constable as if nothing of import had taken place. The excitement was intense during the time the jury were out, and when they returned to the court-room the silence was very oppressive until the sentence was pronounced. The talk on the street is nothing but the Harvey case, and the general remarks are that the sentence is a just one.

Surprise and Presentation.

On Thursday evening, Oct. 24th, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Hind were surprised by their many friends who met to show them their respect as they were leaving for their new home at Woodstock. After enjoying a pleasant evening, an address was read by the Rev. C. R. Morrow, and they were presented with a handsome silver sugar bowl, tea pot, pickle cruet and one dozen spoons, after which Mr. Hind replied in a suitable manner on behalf of himself and wife. The following is the address:

MR. WILLIAM HIND:
Dear Brother,—We are met this evening to perform a very pleasant duty. When we heard of your contemplated removal from among us we could not but recall your many years of faithful service in our Sabbath school. We felt we could not let you leave us without coming to say Good-bye, and leaving you and your devoted wife, a small memento of our regard for you both, and our appreciation of your services cheerfully given. We trust that your work in the future may be even more abundantly owned by the divine Master and that we all in our earthly struggles are o'er may meet in that wondrous school where the Lord of all shall be superintendent.

Attention, Laboring Men and Mechanics.

There are advertisements in the papers from time to time that men are wanted here in the Saginaw valley. Some advertise for house carpenters, some for ship carpenters, and for men to work in the woods, mills and factories. Now there are no men wanted here. There are plenty of men here who are walking the streets looking for a job. The lumber kings and contractors do this to keep wages down. The advertising is done in papers that are published in other states, and especially in Canada. And there are agents in Canada holding out inducements for men to come here in this valley by telling them that wages are from \$20 to \$30 per month. They come here and hire out and go in the woods and work all winter, expecting to get such wages, and in the spring are paid off at \$10 and \$15 per month. Now laboring men and mechanics, when you see these advertisements and hear these agents talk take no heed, but stop and think before you leave your home and families. Ask your friends about it. Write to your friends here, or get your friends to write, and find out if it is so or no, and you will save a good deal of suffering and misery. Men come here and have spent their last cent to get here, and perhaps are arrested for tramps and locked up. Now that has ruined many a good and honest man for when he gets out he is ashamed to be seen by his former associates and fills an easy victim to that class of criminals that is always ready to catch the unwary. Another scheme of these men who advertise is to furnish tickets to men, with which to go from here to the camps, which cost them about 80 cents on the dollar, and it is understood with their foreman, and they work a day or two and perhaps a week and then are told to take the tote road without a cent. Another scheme is to have agents that are selling cheap jewelry of all descriptions into their camps to entice men to buy. They do not ask for any money but will take what time the men have worked and asked enough for their trash to stand a big discount, and the man who does the labor is the loser. The man who works the scheme is the gainer. Now men, those who happen to see this, take heed for you can see that this valley is not the place to make any money and hardly a living, so keep away and give the men who have homes partly paid for, a chance for their lives and you will save a good deal of suffering and hardships.
