ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

A young man named Muloney, of Waterford, N.Y., has died from the effects of cigarette smoking.

Marie Halton, a New York actress, has skipped to Europe in company with a Russian nobleman known as Count B.

The evidence in the Harvey case at Guelph was concluded Wednesday, insanity being the plea of the defence.

A despatch states that the revolution in Guatemala has ended in the triumph of the Government, and that all prisoners have been shot.

The United States warship Galena, for New York, went aground on Romer shoal Thursday morning, but was floated about noon.

Charles Wiseman, of Mount Salem, near Aylmer, was accidentally shot in the breast Thursday while loading a gun. His condition is very serious.

The propeller Africa struck a rock near Clipperton island some time ago and sunk, but was released. She is now on the dry dock at Collingwood.

Hon. Jesse M. Bowell died Thursday at Pittsburg. His skull was crushed by a stone thrown by Capt. Decatur Abrahams at Bell Vernon, Pa., last month. The captain is in jail.

A Chicago despatch says the C.P.R. will have a line of steel steamships, to be the finest craft on the lakes, running between Chicago and Owen Sound before the season of 1890 closes.

Mr. Albert Begy, foreman in J. C. Harris' cigar factory, St. Catharines, dropped dead at his home Thursday afternoon. Heart disease was the cause. He leaves a wife and child.

Thirty tramps have been captured and jailed in the Lebanon valley, Pa. The country is overrun with tramps and they are committing numerous crimes.

Harry Durand, the alleged opium smuggler, who escaped from Port Huron officers some time ago while being taken to jail, has been captured at Live Oak, Mich., and is in Wayne county jail.
