NATIONAL CURRENCY A NEED.—Why is it that an American "Greenback" passes at par in Canada, and that a Canadian bank bill, no matter how good its standing of the bank issuing it may be, is subject to a large discount in the United States? The reason is that in the one case the currency is backed by all the financial resources of the country, and in the other it merely represents the credit of some local banking institution. We in Canada are well aware that the notes of all the banks are A. 1, but the same confidence does not extend among the people to the south of us. They may be excused if they are not as well informed on that matter as ourselves. One of the needs of this country is the establishment of a national currency which shall be respected at home and abroad, and in which all parties will find the fullest confidence. Even in Canada itself bank bills have been subject to a discount if issued, say, for instance, in Nova Scotia or Prince Edward Island. Latterly, recognizing this defect, an arrangement has been made between some of the banks to mutually redeem the bills issued by them. This is very good as far as it goes, and it marks the necessity now felt that the currency in use in the country should pass at par all over it. The best way of securing that undeniable necessity is, to make the currency national in all respects. Then the security being absolute the confidence felt will be undoubted.—London Free Press.
