DIVISION COURT.—Division court was held in the Music Hall on Wednesday of last week. Judge Upper presiding. The following cases were disposed of: Crawford vs. Cherry—This case was tried before a jury and was given in favor of the plaintiff for \$100.00. Bowden vs. Lowery—for wages; judgment for plaintiff, \$21.85. Rodgers vs. Daily—newspaper subscription; given in favor of defendant. Duncan vs. Giles—guarantee; judgment for plaintiff, \$50.50. Boyd vs. Erwin—building contract; judgment for plaintiff, \$22.00, each paying their own costs. There were also a number of judgment summons disposed of.

CHEATED HIMSELF OUT OF \$11,000.—The report of the special auditor appointed by the Essex county council to Treasurer Wright's books, shows that the township owes Mr. Wright \$11,272. Year after year Mr. Wright found a deficit in his books, which he couldn't account for, and he was compelled to sell nearly \$10,000 worth of property at different times to make this good. He at length asked for a special audit, and this showed that he had, by his bad book keeping, cheated himself out of more than \$11,000. The county council are at a quandary how to raise funds to repay the treasurer.
