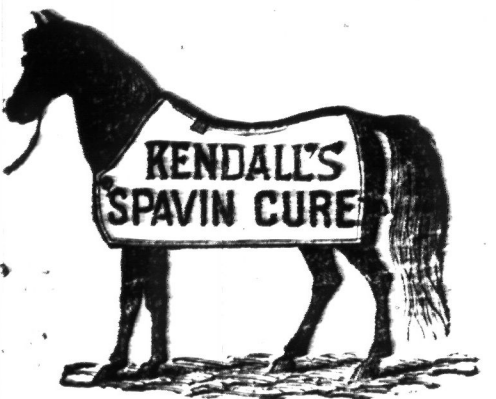

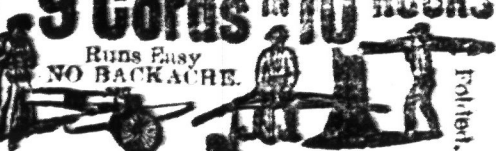

### CURRENT NOTES.

The liquidators of the Federal Bank have paid during the last 20 months debts amounting to \$4,250,000, covering all the liabilities. The residue will be considerable.

The clothing and surgical instruments of the murdered Dr. Cronin have been found in a sewer half a mile from where the body was discovered, and only a block away from where the trunk was found.

The crop Bulletin of the Manitoba Department of Agriculture has been issued. The returns bear date October 1. The average yield of wheat per acre for the province is now placed at 12.4 bushels, oats 16.8, barley 13.6, potatoes 119. The average yield of wheat per acre from 1883 to 1887 was 20.6. The present season is the most unfavorable as regards weather in the history of the province.

The American Humane Association, at its annual meeting in Louisville, Kentucky, on September 28th, adopted resolutions requesting every State or Local Society in the Union to endeavor to obtain from its Legislature a law making it a penal offense to detain cattle, to dock the tails of horses, or to shoot pigeons and other birds from traps. Our Humane Societies should take similar action.

A number of natives of Solomon Islands decapitated an Englishman named Nelson, and three native boys to one of their villages and murdered them. The bodies of their victims were devoured by their murderers. Upon learning of the massacre, the Captain of the British cruiser Royalist proceeded to the scene and shelled the villages along the coast. The natives fled to the hills, where they are safe. Other cases of cannibalism on the island are reported.

In the United States, the electoral college of 1888 had 401 votes with 201 necessary to an election. In 1892 four new states will bring the electoral college to 411 votes and two hundred and eight will be necessary to an election. Already there is a great deal of figuring on the new possibilities of the enlarged college, but it is asserted no reasonable combinations can be imagined that will change the main fact—New York and Indiana will decide the next national election, as they did the last.

The profits derived from stock farming may usually be credited to the better half of the stock kept. The poorer half seldom pays the cost of keeping, and often entails losses which more than counter-balance the profits derived from the opposite class. It should be the aim of every farmer to grow stock that will sell. Turning the product into cash is, after all, the test of value. Cattle or horses that cannot be sold when a surplus is on hand are very unprofitable, as they are constant consumers, and if not producing something marketable soon make a loss. It is as necessary for the farmer to study the market and its probable future demands as it is for the business man.

According to a Government statement the wheat crop of Russia this year is about 91,000,000 bushels smaller than that of last year, while the yield of rye, which is much used for bread in Northern Europe, is 95,000,000 short. The falling-off in wheat alone is about twenty-five per cent. of the normal crop. Austria-Hungary, it is now certain, will be able to export no flour at all this year, while in the last seven months

India has shipped to Europe only sixty-five per cent. of the amount of her shipments in the same period last year. From these and other facts it is inferred that the surplus bread-stuffs of the United States will be barely sufficient to meet the deficiency in the Old World. It is well to remember that estimates of this sort have almost invariably proved erroneous.

It is firmly established that animals in low bodily condition are more subject to disease than vigorous, thrifty animals. That which makes the farm animal thrifty and vigorous, and therefore less liable to disease, also makes it profitable. The more wholesome the food, drink and surroundings of the animal, the stronger its appetite and the more thorough its digestion. It eats well, the excess above the food of support is at the maximum, and as this, measures the gain the profit is large. As digestion is vigorous, the amount of food which escapes assimilation is reduced to the minimum. Where "poor condition" is not allowed to exist, disease is scarcely known, and at the same time the animal makes the largest return for the food consumed.

The Grimshy Independent wants a reform in the matter of statute labor—wants it reformed out of existence. The Independent is right. The performance of statute labor on township roads is nothing but a screaming farce. The farmers get together, talk about crops, politics and the weather. Then they heave a few clods of earth upon a comparatively good road, and spoil it for the rest of the season. Then they take a smoke and talk about horses, the European war cloud, and the latest neighborhood scandal. Then they go home, and the statute labor is done. In nine cases out of ten the little work done has made the road worse, instead of better. But it will be no easy matter to induce the average farming man to consent to a reform. He doesn't like to put his hand in his pocket and pay out good money wretchedly to make good roads when he can loaf in the fence corner two or three days during the summer and have bad roads. We hope the independent may be able to reform the statute labor business; but it has undertaken a mighty task—Hamilton Spectator.
