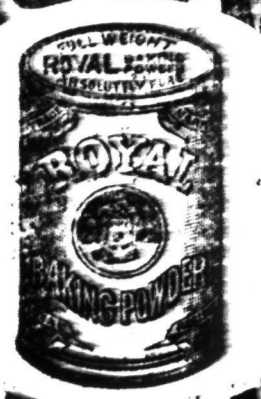

The directors of the B. W. & L. E. railroad have let the contract for a station to be built at Scotland. It will cost in the neighborhood of \$700.

The accommodation on the N. & N. W. now leaves this station going north at 6.35 a.m. according to the new time table which took effect on Nov. 17th.
