The Dead Man Identified.

CONSTABLE HAWKIN'S VICTIM WAS JAS. D. DOUGLAS, OF STREETSVILLE.

HAMILTON, Sept. 28.—All the mystery which surrounded the identity of the unfortunate man who was shot by Constable Hawkins early on Thursday morning has been cleared away. This afternoon James Douglas, of Streetsville arrived in town to see the deceased, he thinking from the description that appeared in the papers that it was a cousin of his who lived in Thamesford. Immediately on his arrival he went to Blachford's and viewed the corpse. He identified it at once as that of his cousin, James Douglas. He sent the following telegram to another cousin of his in St. Mary's:

Your brother James is the man that has been shot in Hamilton. I have recognized him. Come to Walsh's hotel, Station house, at once. JAMES DOUGLAS.

Mr. Douglas, was not disposed to impart much information, but he was apparently laboring under great excitement, and was too much affected by the occurrence to feel like talking about it.

THE DEAD MAN'S HISTORY.

Later in the day a Miss Graham, who has rooms in Lister's block, where she and her sister carry on the manufacture of wax flowers, hair jewellery, etc., gave the following history of the dead man: Learning from the afternoon papers that the body lying at Blachford's undertaking establishment was that of an old friend, with whose family she has been on intimate terms for many years—in fact, since the deceased was a child. He was well educated, she said, and good circumstances, his father having left him a fine farm of 200 acres with first-class buildings and well stocked. Miss Graham did not know much about James Douglas since he arrived at manhood, but knew that he was not disposed to settle down to the life of a farmer. The entire family are in good circumstances and well connected. There are four sisters and two brothers now living—John, who lives at St. Mary's and to whom the telegram was sent, and Charles, who lives in Thamesford. Over two years ago, Miss Graham, said she heard that James had

and that his relatives had placed him in the Toronto Insane Asylum. He was released shortly afterwards, and returned home, but relapsed into his former condition, and was again confined in the Toronto institution. Upon being given his liberty a second time he was so incensed with his relatives for having him put in the asylum that he refused to go home with them. He went away, and for some time they were unable to discover his whereabouts. At this period, which was about a year ago, Miss Graham was requested to furnish the police authorities here with his description, which she did. He was afterwards discovered in Detroit. Two weeks ago a sister of the deceased, while on a visit to Hamilton, told Miss Graham that her brother John had shortly before seen James in Detroit and left some money with him. Deceased, according to Miss Graham's recollection, would be about 35 or 36 years of age.

An aunt of the dead man, who lives in Ancaster, was in the city on Saturday afternoon, and returned home oblivious of the fact that it was her nephew's body which was lying in the undertaker's establishment.

REMOVAL OF THE VICTIM FOR BURIAL.
John Douglas, the brother, who was expected here from West Zorra, near St. Mary's arrived this morning. He was much affected by the sad circumstances of his brother's death and expressed his indignation at the way in which the attempted arrest was carried out and which led to the shooting. In the afternoon he took the remains from Blachford's undertaking rooms and carried them with him to Streetsville for burial.

HAMILTON, Sept. 30.—The funeral of

James Douglas, the victim of Constable Hawkins' chance shot, took place at Streetsville this afternoon, the body having been taken there yesterday afternoon by John Douglas, the brother of the dead man.

The coroner's jury in the shooting case met again to-night. After taking the evidence of several pawnbrokers whom the deceased tried to buy a revolver, the jury asked the coroner to have the doctors of the asylum in which Douglas had been confined called to testify as to the mental condition. The inquest then adjourned until Tuesday, Oct. 8.

Walpole Exhibition.

The Walpole Agricultural Society will hold their 37th Annual Exhibition in Jarvis on Tuesday and Wednesday next, October 8th and 9th. The directors are sparing neither time nor money in making this exhibition the best ever held by the society. The prizes offered for stock, agricultural products and domestic manufactures are as large as those of any other society in the county. The educating effects of exhibitions, and the beneficial results from the stimulus they give to the production of the best grades of stock and produce, are now generally recognized and acknowledged, and there will no doubt be a large attendance of the yeoman and their families of this district at this Exhibition.

The entries are coming in, many of them from a distance and the prospects are that the exhibition this year, should the weather prove favorable, will be in advance of those of previous years. The capable and painstaking directors have such confidence in the growing popularity of the institution that they have increased the amount offered in prizes each year and a still larger increase in the number of exhibits may be looked for next week.

Special attractions this year will be an important feature, as they are much more extensive than in previous years.

The officers and directors have decided to give a grand present to the first couple who will volunteer to get married on the fair grounds on Wednesday the second day of the fair at half-past four o'clock. The bride will be presented with a gold watch valued at \$50.00 by the President of the fair. The directors will build a platform where the ceremony will take place. The lady will have the privilege of choosing her own minister. The officers will also send Mr. Ed. Lea's beautiful double carriage and team to any house in Jarvis and convey them back to the station in the same.
