NEWS FROM ALL POINTS.

A General Epitome of Events of the Week.

ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

Mr. Wm. Campbell has been appointed post master of Goderich.

Ex-Surgeon-General of the Navy Joseph Beale died at Philadelphia on Monday, aged 75.

A theatre at Montau Italy was burned Wednesday. Two workmen were killed.

A terrible storm raged at Naples Wednesday last. A large part of Naples was submerged.

The Catholic chaplains in the Irish jails are combining to claim exemption from the prison rule.

By the collapse of an unfinished house in Milan, Italy, five persons were killed and twenty injured.

The captain of the Spanish crew recently captured by the Moors has died from the effects of ill-usage.

Joseph Kemp, who was under the debris at Quebec 110 hours and was got out alive, died from the reaction.

Miners and business men of Deming, New Mexico, are urging the free importation of lead ores from Mexico.

Six thousand Catholics at Munich have adopted resolutions favoring restoration of the Pope's temporal power.

The wedding of Emmons Blaine and Miss Anita McCormick took place at Richfield Springs Thursday.

The ship Titania will leave Victoria, B.C., to-morrow for London with a cargo of salmon and furs valued at \$268,825.

Two priests connected with the Clonmel jail have been dismissed for supplying Dr. Tanner with sandwiches and tobacco.

Daniel Robinson, president of the Troy and Boston railroad, died Wednesday morning last at Bennington Centre, Vermont, aged 75.

The body of Aeronaut Walrath, who dropped with his balloon into Otsego Lake New York, on Tuesday last, has not yet been found.

A man who registered as John Mc Bain, and claiming London as his home, walked off the wharf at Cornwall last Wednesday evening and was drowned.

At Moorehead, Minn., F. J. Schreiber was shot and killed Tuesday night week by his nephew, John F. Schreiber, who is believed to be insane.

Reports from various localities in Florida indicate that Monday's storm was disastrous to property. The total damage will aggregate \$40,000.

The park commissioners of New York have passed a resolution opposing the use of any portion of the Central Park as a site for the World's Fair.

Disgusted Dakotans.

A YOUNG FARMER'S VIEWS OF CANADA AS COMPARED WITH THE STATES.

From the Portage la Prairie Review, Sept. 28.

Mr. A. D. Campbell, of Glenfield, Foster county, Dakota, called at the Review office on Saturday and gave us the benefit of an interview with him relative to some of his experiences during the past five years in Dakota. Mr. Campbell is an intelligent young farmer who moved from Brant county, Ont., to Dakota five years ago. He is well known in that part of Ontario, but perhaps not so well as his brother, who is now treasurer of the county of Brant. Mr. Campbell's present trip to Manitoba is for the purpose of seeking homes for his own and twenty-five other families living around him in Dakota, who are

DISGUSTED WITH THE COUNTRY, and are bound to get out at any cost. He had been west as far as Calgary, and stopped off here on Friday to look over the Portage plains. He said, in relating his experiences, "there are lots of young men in Ontario who are perhaps working on rented farms, and they may be thinking of coming to Dakota, and I want to give them a word of warning not to come. We made the mistake in going there, and they can profit by our failures. I have worked away there for five years, sunk what money I had and I'll not be able to take out \$600. I'd be mighty glad if I could \$1 for that amount when I go back. Two years ago our crops were a total failure, and the country had to furnish us with seed. Last year the same thing happened, and the county again came to our rescue.

THIS YEAR WE HAVE NO CROPS, and the county cannot help us for it has already borrowed money to the extent of its bonding power, and what we are going to do now, if the United States Government does not come to our rescue, God only knows. The only sure thing we have about farming there is taxes. We pay fifteen mills on the dollar of county tax and twelve mills besides for school tax. Every thing is taxed in the house and out of it. In good years when the crop is not a failure the best average is fifteen bushels an acre. We live 30 miles from market, and last year

When we took it to the store the merchants gave six cents a pound for it at first and then they quit taking it altogether. We begged them to ship it to St. Paul and get what they could for it and give it to us, but they wouldn't touch it." In addition to this bit of his experience Mr. Campbell gave us a little of his opinion, too, and we give it as nearly as may be, as we got it. He said: "You fellows are all Grits up in this country. You needn't deny it now; I know all about it, for haven't I talked with people from Winnipeg clear through to Calgary and you are all Grits. You are kicking against the National Policy, and you are just

CUTTING YOUR OWN THROATS.

You think if you get the duty off and get American machinery in here you would be all right, but you are mistaken. The Yankees will use you well till they get you solid with your duty off, and then look out. Why, I saw an American plough up the line sold for \$75, and they charge us down in Dakota \$85 for the same machine. These Yankee land agents and railway people are nice enough till they get you located, and then you are not of much account after that. You people here had better build up a Pennsylvania and Connecticut down in Ontario and Quebec. They'll do your manufacturing and you raise stuff to feed them. Don't send your money to build up St. Paul and other cities in the United States. Canada for the Canadians I say. A man who is a Grit ought to go and live in Dakota a while and he'll soon make a mighty good Tory." Mr. Campbell was driven over the Portage plains, and to say that he was astonished at our yield of 30 to 40 bushels of fine wheat to the acre would be putting it mildly. He left on Monday for Winnipeg and for his home in Dakota. He will advise those by whom he was sent up here to pull up stakes and come to Manitoba just as soon as they can.

TRACTION ENGINES ON HIGHWAYS.

Sections 6 and 7, Chapter 200, of the Revised Statutes of Ontario, in reference to Traction Engines, says:—"In case of any difficulty, or the prospect of any difficulty, in the meeting or passing of an engine upon the highway by any mounted horse-man or vehicle, it shall be the duty of the engine driver to stop the engine, and in every reasonable way to assist such mounted horseman, or the person in charge of such vehicle, to pass the engine." "Every engine run after dark shall carry a bright red light in a conspicuous place in front, and a green light on the rear of the train." 10. (1) Before it shall be lawful to run such engines over any highway whereupon no tolls are levied, it shall be the duty of the person or persons proposing to run the same to strengthen, at his or their own expenses, all bridges and culverts to be crossed by such engines, and to keep the same in repair so long as the highway is so used. (2) The costs of such repairs shall be borne by the owners of different engines in proportion to the number of engines run over such bridges or culverts.
