Land boomers are flocking to Pierre, S. D.
Six inches of snow fell at Lockport, N. Y., Sunday.

The State of Yucatan, Mexico, is bankrupt financially.

The Lancashire cotton mills are still running on half time.
John G. Loyd, residing near Gananoque, is dead, aged 106 years.

Lightning played havoc at Mount Bridges and Sundridge Thursday.

The death of Rev. Dr. Rand, the famous Micmac missionary, is announced.
The veterans of the British army and navy at Hamilton have formed a society.

The strike of window glassblowers, which began last June was settled by arbitration.

Seventy-five thousand dollars worth of silver ore was shipped from the Port Arthur district during September.

The ball given at Regina, N.W.T., on Saturday night in honor of the Governor-General was a grand success.

General Master Workman Powderly addressed 5,000 in Chicago last night, on the Sunday closing of saloons.

Bishop Cleary has given the fifth donation of \$1,000 towards the building fund of St. Mary's cathedral at Kingston.

The C.P.R. Company will make big improvements on their line between Port Arthur and Rat Portage this winter.

Sir William Tindall Robertson, M.P. for Brighton, committed suicide Sunday during a fit of insanity. He cut his throat.

Over a hundred Mormon converts have arrived in new York from Germany. Over half of them were young girls between 13 and 18 years of age.

Thirty people have been killed during a storm on the Island of Sardinia. Sixteen persons were killed in the Province of Cagliari.

Father Boyle, a Roman Catholic priest, was convicted of criminal assault at Raleigh, N.C., on Saturday, and sentenced to be hanged on November 9.

Mrs. Lapierre, wife of a Montreal police constable, was burned to death on Saturday night. A coal oil lamp exploded, setting fire to her clothing.

Two more bodies were taken out of the river at Johnstown, Pa., Sunday. From present appearances there are a great many dead yet in the river.

A young man named William McDonald, said to be insane, has been arrested at St. John, charged with sending the poisoned candies to Rev. Dr. McRae, and causing the death of Mrs. McRae.
A Chinese leper, in a terrible physical condition, has arrived at San Francisco from New York, where he had been cooking for the men working on the aqueduct. No precautions had been taken by the authorities to prevent a spread of the contagion.
