### Walpole Fall Fair.

THE EXHIBITION OF WALPOLE AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY A GRAND SUCCESS.

The 37th annual exhibition of the above society took place here on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week. The weather was fine on both days. It looked cloudy on the morning of the second day, and perhaps prevented a larger number from coming in on the morning trains. However, a large number drove in after dinner and about 5000 people were on the grounds in the afternoon. The Villa Nova band was in attendance and filled the air with sweet music.

The entries were larger this year than in former years. A large number of fine horses in all classes were on the grounds and kept the judges very busy during the afternoon.

The show of cattle was fair, but that of sheep, swine and poultry was particularly good.

The hall was not so well filled as in former years. The display of fancy work was not so large as usual though there was a fair display in all lines.

The quality of grain, fruit and vegetables was up to the standard, but the number of exhibits in many cases were less.

The cricket match was not played as the Hagersville boys failed to put in an appearance.

As there was no couple who would volunteer to be married on the grounds the wedding was not performed.

In the men's race there were two entries but failed to appear when called on.

The races was the most interesting feature of the day and were well contested. In the three minute race Leo Bell secured the first two heats but was beaten in the next three heats by Flirt, which the following score shows: Flirt, W. B. Smith, Simcoe, 2 1 1 1 Leo Bell, O. In the 2.45 race there were three entries, and was very interesting. Jack Stanton won the first heat with Dominion Boy and Iron Duke close behind. Dominion Boy won the second heat in an exciting race. In the third heat shortly after leaving the judges' stand the horses were all closely together, when Jude Lawson, driving Dominion Boy, ran against a calf which was crossing the track at the time upsetting his sulky, throwing him off, breaking the sulky and slightly injuring the horse. Jude received a few bruises but nothing serious. He did not finish the race. Jack Stanton won the heat though crowded very closely by Iron Duke, he being only a few inches behind. Stanton won the fourth heat.
