## NEWS FROM ALL POINTS.

### A General Epitome of Events of the Week.

#### ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

Judge Oliver died suddenly at Ottawa on Thursday evening.  
An attempt is being made in the New York to form a carpet trust.  
Senator Sanford will erect another large business block in Winnipeg.  
It is proposed to connect Lake Erie with the Ohio river with a ship canal.  
Hard coal is selling for \$9.50 per ton in Winnipeg.  
There are several cases of yellow fever at Key West.  
A local insurance board will be formed at London, Ont.  
A wife beater was flogged at the Baltimore, Md., jail Thursday.  
Track laying was commenced Thursday on the Great North-west Central.  
The farmers of Stevens county, Kansas, have suffered four successive crop failures.  
Professional burglars made a raid on the business places of Elora on Tuesday night last.  
Wheat is now passing through Winnipeg for the east at the rate of 100 cars per day.  
Mr. Thomas Workman, sr., the millionaire hardware merchant of Montreal died Wednesday.  
The jury in the case of Morrison, the Megantic outlaw, returned a verdict of manslaughter Wednesday morning.  
It is proposed to start an umbrella factory in Toronto in which 200 hands will be employed.  
A patent medicine pedler named Graham was found dead in his bed at Stratroy Thursday morning.  
The SS. City of New York went aground on Wednesday night in Gedney's channel. Her passengers were taken off and brought to New York.  
There was a terrific boiler explosion at Dovey's shingle mill, Lindsay, early Thursday morning, when the engineer, John Poles, was instantly killed.  
The Norwegian barque Terpeichore, Capt. Neilson, from Liverpool to Quebec, has been wrecked. The crew were saved.  
A fire occurred at the Jackson, Mich., penitentiary Wednesday, and the convicts worked like beavers to extinguish the flames.  
A quantity of oleomargarine has been seized by the customs authorities at St. Thomas. It was brought over from the States.

Judge Rose has recently given a very important decision in regard to the right of a police officer to handcuff a prisoner. A man was arrested and taken before a magistrate for furnishing a Central Prison convict with tobacco. The judge held that there was nothing wrong in this, and he severely reprimanded the detective who made the arrest for using the handcuffs. To handcuff an untried prisoner, unless he resists arrest, is trespass, according to the law, and in this case the detective will have to pay the handcuffed man \$200 damages and the cost of the suit. Police officers would do well to overhaul their rules of conduct and when found "make a note on't."
