Township council met on Monday. Full report next week.

We are in receipt of two copies of the Winnipeg Sun from Mr. Harry Firth.

Mr. George Beck, has rented Mr. B. Stallwood's farm on Stage Road, and moved to the same yesterday.

Rev. Mr. Francis, of Waterdown, formerly of Jarvis, is now rector of St. John's Church Cayuga.

John Featherstone shipped two car load of fat cattle from this station on Thursday for the English Market.

The fall assizes commenced yesterday at Cayuga before Mr. Justice Street. A number of important cases are to be tried.

Mr. Parkinson's cheese factory, near Jarvis, was burned on Wednesday night. Guess again.

Don't forget the lectures in the Methodist Church, on Monday and Wednesday evenings next by Rev. Chas. Deacon. These lectures are highly spoken of by the press. Admission 15c., children 10c.

Some sneak-thief stole a buffalo robe from Mr. Wm. Parkinson's buggy on the second night of the fair from the Commercial Hotel sheds, but acted wisely and returned to the shed. He is supposed to be the same person that was mentioned in our columns some time ago for a similar offence.

The oldest inhabitant says the coming winter is going to be a hard one. Skins of apples, grapes, and other fruit are tougher than last winter; corn husks are thicker and stronger than for years; wheat and rye straw is tougher; hay is wirier, and seed pods are more protected than usual. These signs are good ones, because they don't come from any moon-planting superstition, but from actual observation year by year.

A painful accident occurred on the plank road near the Dogs' Nest on Friday last to Homer, eldest son of Norris Smithson who was moving to Port Dover from this village. It appears that he and another boy were taking a load of wood, which gave way in the front of the wagon throwing the lad to the ground, the front wheel passing over his face smashing it badly. He was driven to Port Dover where his wounds were attended to. The boy is getting along as well as could be expected.

On Wednesday evening 1st fire broke out in Mr. S. Underhill's barn about a mile and a half east of this village, burning it to the ground, together with the season's crop of grain. The barn was filled to the roof with grain, also two stacks outside. He had not yet threshed, and we learn the machine was to have been placed in the barn the next day. The cause of the fire is not known as Mr. Underhill was in town at time and when he arrived at the scene the barn and contents were totally consumed. We believe the buildings and grain were insured in the Waterloo, for \$1,500.

The Annual Sabbath School Convention for the County of Haldimand was held in the Methodist Church, Cayuga, on the 8th, and 9th, inst. The meetings were exceedingly interesting and instructive. The addresses and discussions on time of the most important subjects connected with Sabbath School work were characterized by great power and earnestness. A spirit of deep devotion to the religious education of the young pervaded all the proceedings of the convention. The Rev. Mr. Wells of Jarvis was elected President of the Association.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—It is our painful duty this week to record the death of two children of Mr. John Wilton, Gypsum Mines, the result of an accident with gunpowder. It appears that on Thursday of last week Thomas and Maggie Walton, aged ten and six years respectively, were in the Mines, the former trying to set off a charge which he had in the ferrule of an old umbrella, and it is supposed that he accidentally threw the match into a nearly empty keg of powder, which went off in a flash, causing the little room to fill with smoke, suffocating him at once. The little girl fell on the floor, and the draft from below kept the smoke from her. When she recovered consciousness she opened the door and ran to the nearest neighbor, her clothing on fire, and told what had happened. She was very badly burned, and lingered on in great agony until Wednesday, when death put an end to her suffering. The bereaved parents have the deep sympathy of the whole community.—Advocate.

Haldimand Election.

When Judge Falconbridge took his seat at the Criminal Assizes Monday morning he proceeded to deliver the following judgement in re Haldimand election: On the delivery of my judgement on September 10, which judgement was invited by the petitioner without reference to other charges then partially tried, I became functus officio as to this case; and I therefore gave no judgement as to those charges in which some evidence had been taken before that date. I was asked to reserve any decision as to costs, and I now dispose of them as follows:—The petitioner will have the general costs of the petition and trial. The respondent will be entitled to the cost occasioned by the charges of corrupt acts by agents, on which he has succeeded. There will be no costs to either party of the charges on which evidence was taken and no judgement given. There will be no costs to either party of the personal charges. I would give Mr. Colter his costs of those charges but that in both instances, viz. in treating on the afternoon of the polling day and in writing the letter of July 28, 1887, to Henry Kinsely he acted most indiscreetly, though not, I think, corruptly.

A more censorious Court might well have taken a less lenient view of the postscript to that epistle and might have read between the lines a direct invitation to vote for the respondent.

The recipient of the letter took that meaning from it. He swore:—"I supposed he wanted me to mind him when I came to vote."
