## NEWS FROM ALL POINTS.

### A General Epitome of Events of the Week.

#### ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

Mr. P. T. Barnum has arrived in England.  
The Conservative majority in Richelieu, was 334.  
Two inches of snow fell at Rat Portage on Friday night.  
Senator James Turner died at his residence in Hamilton on Saturday.  
It has been decided to close the Paris Exposition on November 6.  
Large quantities of potatoes are being shipped from Nova Scotia to Havana.  
Three Germen Anarchists have been expelled from Switzerland.  
The session of the North-west Legislative Assembly has opened at Regina.  
The smallpox scare shows no sign of abating in the villages in South Essex.  
Mr. H. T. DuTy is the Liberal candidate for the Quebec Legislature for Bromes.  
The students' strike in Montreal will, it is now thought, be amicably arranged very soon.  
The London Canadian Gazette warmly praises Mr. Laurier on account of his Toronto speech.  
Austrian and German banks have made a loan of \$5,000,000 to the Bulgarian Government.  
An oil well yielding 1,000 barrels a day has been struck just outside of Pittsburg, Pa.  
Official returns of the Montana election show that the Republicans will have a majority in the Legislature.  
Gen. A. B. Campbell, of Kansas, has been tendered the position of consul at Melbourne, Australia, and will accept.  
A resident of Guelph has fallen heir to an estate yielding an income of \$150,000 a year.  
During the past two year ten men were killed and seventeen injured by electric light wires in New York.  
The national treasury of Mexico is said to have been robbed of half a million dollars in bonds.  
General Green B. Raum, of Illinois, has been appointed United States commissioner of pensions.  
Senator Merner was welcomed back from Europe by a banquet in New Hamburg on Friday night.  
The strike of the coal miners at Lens, France, has been settled. The masters conceded the demands of the men.  
A general strike for an advance of 10 per cent. in wages will be inaugurated by the Pittsburg moulders to-day.  
The first giraffe ever born in captivity in America saw the light at the zoological garden in Cincinnati Sunday.  
A young lawyer, named George W. McGuire, jumped into the Erie canal at Rochester Sunday and drowned himself.

The Labrador coast fishery this year is a complete failure, and over one hundred families are reported to be starving.

Archbishop Fabre has directed the exclusion of the rebellious medical students from the Catholic hospitals in Montreal.

The C. P. R. Detroit extension has been completed from London to Chatham, and twenty-five cars of apples arrived in London over it.

The window glassblowers of Pennsylvania will return to work, the differences regarding wages having been settled with the employers.

### What Invention Has Done.

In the manufacture of boots and shoes the work of 500 operatives is now done by 100.

In making bread boxes three workers can do the work of thirteen box makers by old methods.

In cutting out clothing and cloth caps with dies one worker does the work of three by the old methods.

A carpet measuring and brushing machine with one operator will do the work of fifteen men by the old methods.

In leather manufacture modern methods have reduced the necessary number of workers from 5 to 50 per cent.

In the manufacture of flour modern improvements save 75 per cent. of the manual labor that once was necessary.

In making tin cans one man and a boy with modern appliances can do the work of ten workers by the old processes.

By the use of coal mining machines 160 miners in a month can mine as much coal in the same time as 500 miners by the old methods.

One boy by machinery in turning wood-work and materials for musical instruments performs the work of twenty-five men by the old methods.

The horse power steam used in the United States on railways, steamers and in the factories and mines was in 1888 12,100,000, against 1,610,000 in 1850.

In nailing on shoe heels one worker and a boy with machinery can heel 300 pairs of shoes per day. It would require five workers to do the same by hand.

In the manufacture of brick improved devices save one-tenth of the labor, and in the manufacturing of fire brick 40 per cent. of the manual labor is displaced.

In stave dressing twelve co-laborers with a machine can dress 12,000 staves in the same time that the same number of workers by hand could dress 2,500 staves.

In the manufacture of carriages it used to take one man thirty-five days to make a carriage. It is now made by the aid of machinery with the work of one man in twelve days.—Nebraska State Journal.

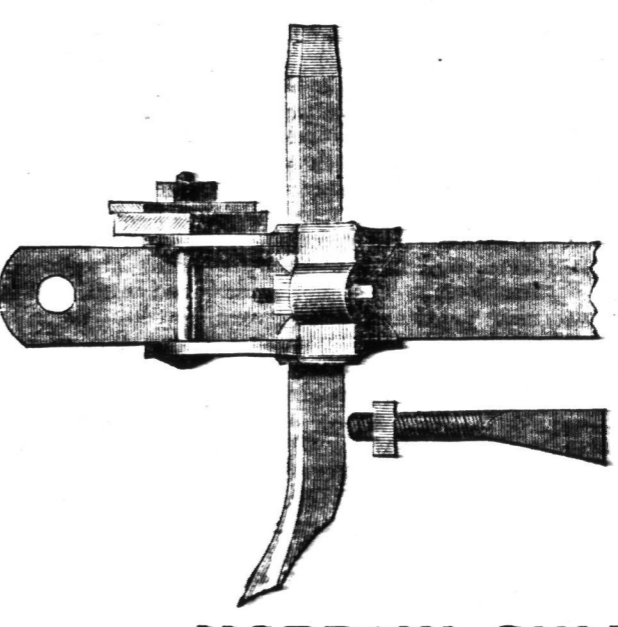
