Reuben Shoupe Dead.

JOHN MOORE WILL PROBABLY BE TRIED FOR MAN-SLAUGHTER.

Reuben Shoupe, who had his skull smashed in by a cordwood stick in a fight which occurred on a Northern and North-western train on the night of Sept. 13, died Thursday morning at Hagersville. The full particulars of the affair were published at the time. The row occurred on a special train which was run for the convenience of those who had attended Barnum's circus. Many of the passengers were drunk, and the trainmen experienced some difficulty in keeping the tongs quiet. When the train was ascending the mountain three of the tongs attacked Reuben Shoupe, a telegraph operator at Hagersville. William Vaughn, one of the gang, struck Brakeman McTague. He was arrested for that offense and was fined \$15 dollars and costs. McTague knocked him off the platform. Afterwards Shoupe was struck on the head with a cordwood stick, and John Moore was suspected of being the assailant. Shoupe was found in an apparently dying condition. The blow took effect over the right eye, and made a hole in the skull an inch and a half long and over an inch wide. It was expected that he would die, but for a couple of weeks he showed signs of improvement. A few days ago he became worse and Thursday morning he died.

Moore was committed for trial for feloniously assaulting Shoupe. The grand jury at the last assizes brought in a true bill, but as Shoupe could not attend court the case was adjourned until the January assizes. Moore was admitted to bail. It is likely that the charge will be man-slaughter.

The inquest was held on Friday. The post-mortem examination, made by Dr. Forbes, of Caledonia, showed a fracture about six inches long in the skull, running across the front and right parietal bones. The brain matter was much inflamed, and considerable pus was found. Not much new evidence was elicited, but was conclusive in proving that Moore is the guilty man. The verdict was that -

John Moore, on the 13th day of September 1889, at Glanford Station, in the County of Wentworth, did feloniously and unlawfully cause the death of one Reuben H. Shoupe, by striking him on the head with a stick, against the peace of our Lady the Queen, her crown and dignity.

John Moore was arrested and taken to Hamilton, where he will remain in jail until the January Assizes.

Reuben Shoupe was buried on Saturday in the Springville Cemetery. The funeral was conducted by the Odd-fellows' society and the Telegraphers' union. Lodges of the L.O.O.F. were present from Waterford and Jarvis. The people of Hagersville and adjoining townships turned out in large numbers, making a very large procession.

On Sunday morning at four o'clock fire broke out in the pump factory of Spencer & Sebring, Colborne street, Simcoe. A brisk wind from the north fanned the flames and the fire spread rapidly. The steam engine was promptly at work, but the buildings being frame, was entirely consumed with a large stock of pumps, a loom for weaving window blinds, and tools and appliances. The total loss is estimated at \$2,500; insurance on building \$400, on stock \$400. The rain of Saturday, and the drizzling fall during the fire, prevented the spread of the flames, otherwise there must have been a heavy loss. The fire is supposed to have been incendiary, as no one was working in the shop Saturday. Mr. Sebring being absent from home.
