In order to show that the national terror of a Chinese invasion by immigration is not wholly a baseless fear in the United States, the collector at the port of San Francisco has published a return of the number of Chinese who have entered the country during the Rates for regular advertisements made past sixty-five years. According to this showing, between the years 1820 and 1873, 20,155 Chinese landed. They seem not to have begun their migrations in the early part of this period, for between 1820 and 1831 only two Chinese are reported to have entered. After that they began to come over in greater numbers, and by 1888, 361,693 Chinese were in the country. In 1882, 35,000 arrived, and this number so shocked the sensibilities of the Yankees that the Restriction Act was passed, and this reduced the arrivals to 2 in 1888. Now there is what is supposed to be a total exclusion Act on the statute books, and if any Chinese still find their way into the hospitable republic, they do not honor the San Francisco collector of customs with a call.

Joseph Crawford one of the three seamen who were saved from the wreck of the "Erie Wave" near Clear Creek recently, related his experience on the night of the disaster to the Aylmer Sun,

CLEAR CREEK, Oct. 12, 1889. I was on board of the ill-fated Erie Wave when she capsized. The night was intensely dark and chilly; a heavy gale had sprung up, and the waves raged furiously, rocking the schooner to and fro so violently that all on board became terribly sea-sick. About midnight the storm grew worse and the captain said to Bell and Soper, "I will cut the cable and let her go on shore." They answered: "No, let her ride it out." Searcely had these words left their lips when she capsized. Being pretty full of water, for the pumps had refused to work all the evening, she failed to right herself, and lay rocking on her side, the heavy billows breaking over her until her spars went out.
