The Roman Catholic Bishop of Derry died Sunday.

Gananoque suffered by fire Sunday to the extent of \$100,000.

H.M.S. Tourmaline arrived at Montreal on Saturday evening.

Natural gas been struck at Leamington and near Comber, Ont.,

Mr. Barry Sullivan is once more ill, and is said to be in a serious condition.

The leak in the Cornwall canal has been repaired and navigation resumed.

A deposit of asphalt thirteen feet thick has been discovered near Cleversport, Ky.

Advices from Honolulu state affairs there have been quiet since the race at insurrection.

Col. R. N. Hudson, a prominent public man of Terre Haute, Ind., is dead, aged 70.

The Western Union Telegraph Company has raised its rates, the advance taking effect to-day.

Race troubles have broken out at Greenwood, Miss Gov. Kowry is there with troops.

Hon. Oliver Mowat was a passenger by the S.S. Vancouver, which arrived at Quebec on Saturday.

The Porte has excluded four English papers from Turkey for commenting upon the outrages in Armenia.

The hop crop in Sussex, Eng., is very heavy, averaging, it is said, ten hundred-weight to the acre.

Excessively hot weather has prevailed in the Western and North-western States for the past three days.

It is said all the tanneries in New England and New York have passed into the hands of an English syndicate.

A City of Mexico despatch says: Eight persons have lost their lives by the floods in Zimasan, State of Hidalgo.

John Grass, the great chief of the Black-foot Sioux, is seriously ill at Fort Yates, Dak., and is not expected to live.

Two men named Perisieu were drowned while boating on the Ottawa river Sunday at St. Joseph village, Russell county.

The coal schooner Anna M. Foster, was run into and sunk by H. H. Warner's steam yacht Siesta, off Charlotte, N.Y., on Saturday.

It is said there is a likelihood that the Russian Government will abandon the present severe system of industrial protection.

Albert Brierly, the Liverpool merchant who has gained notoriety through his connection with the Maybrick case, has arrived at Boston.

Gus Witherspoon, a colored glutton of Yorkville, S.C., on a wager of \$1, ate seven dozen eggs at one sitting. He will never eat any more.

Grimsby Park closed for the season with Sunday services, when Dr. Searles, of New York, and Rev. Dr. W. S. Griffin conducted the services.

Louis Elssner, a wool merchant, of New York, has disappeared. It is asserted that he borrowed \$15,000 on wool, most of which is missing from the warehouse.

Mrs. Frank Russell, aged 30 years, residing near Paris Hill, N.Y., has died from the effects of Paris green taken with suicidal intent. Illness made her tired of life.

A Sharon, Mass., telegram says: Horace S. Shepard, treasurer of the Shepard and Morse Lumber Co., whose office is in Boston, has failed. Liabilities, \$100,000; assets, light.

## Toronto's Great Exposition.

TO BE HELD DURING THE NEXT TWO WEEKS.

In a few days the great Industrial Exposition, which is to be held at Toronto from the 9th to the 21st of September, will be in full swing, and visitors will be flocking to it from all parts of the country. The entries show that the exhibits in all departments will be larger and better than ever, and a long programme of special attractions for every day of the Fair has been published. Several new buildings have been erected during the present year and many new features introduced. Excursions are being organized from many distant points in the United States the Maritime Provinces and the North-west, and there will be two special cheap excursions from every point in Ontario. The annual success of this great show is something remarkable; the people appear to justly take a pride in it, and make it the occasion of their annual holiday outing, and there is every probability that this year's show will be away ahead of all others both in extent and quality of the exhibits, as well as the attendance of visitors. Over 700

horses and 600 head of cattle have already been entered, and every foot of space in all the buildings has been applied for. The great Dog Show will be one of the interesting features of the Fair, and the Firework display will be grander than ever before.
