Burglaries continue almost nightly in St. Thomas.
The French elections will take place September 22.
Servian papers threaten an invasion of Bulgaria by the Servians.
Judge G. M. Boswell died at Cobourg Wednesday in his 86th year.
There is an extensive strike of shoe cutters at North Adams Mass.
Richard Milliner, Q.C., died at St. Catharines Wednesday last aged 72.
Mr. Daniel Clark, an old and respected resident of Sarnia, is dead.
A disastrous storm accompanied by floods has raged at Dakayama, Japan.
The North-west council is to meet October 1.
The Lord Mayor of London was once a drummer.
Owen Sound had a successful carnival Thursday.
The municipality of Elton, Man., has paid for 140,000 gopher tails this year.
The Cronin suspects are all to be tried together with the exception of Woodruff.
A London despatch says John Gelli-Brand Hubbard, the first Baron Addington, is dead.
The City of Paris has beat her own record to 5 days 19 hours and 18 minutes.
A sharp shock of earthquake was experienced on Tuesday night last at Los Angeles, Cal.
Port Colborne is jubilant over the discovery of natural gas in that neighborhood.
Gen. Russell A. Alger has been elected National Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic.
A mail bag was stolen from the truck at Brockville station Wednesday and rifled of ten registered letters. No clue.
Ten thousand French workmen will make a pilgrimage to Rome at the end of October.
Counsel for Mrs. Robt. Ray Hamilton says the stabbing of the nurse was justifiable.
Owing to the failure of the crops a famine prevails in Maros-Torda, Eastern Transylvania.
Boston has been chosen for the next encampment for the Grand Army of the Republic.
A millionaire of Vienna, named Fernbach, Thursday killed his wife and then attempted suicide.
Hon. James C. Campbell has been chosen by the democrats of Ohio to oppose Governor Foraker.
The water has been cut off from the citizens of London South, and there is a lively row thereat.
The forest fires near Helena, Mont., have subsided. In other sections, however, destruction is going on.
It is reported that the Russian Government has expelled 500 foreigners, including many Austrians, from Warsaw.
Mrs. Maybrick was removed to Woking prison Wednesday. She wore the regular convict dress and looking well.
Fifteen persons have been burnt to death in Colorado within a month by the bursting of coal oil cans used to light fires.
The Paris correspondent of the London Times is confident Gen. Boulanger will return to France before the election.
It is estimated that the wheat yield in Manitoba and Assiniboia will reach a million bushels over the estimates made.
A Reno, Nev., despatch says: The stage from Bidwell Thursday night was stopped by a highwayman and the Wells-Fargo treasure box stolen.
The German Emperor says the present laws in Prussia do not afford sufficient protection to the workmen, and that reforms are urgently necessary.

Printing in the Sixteenth Century.

Printing was slow in the years immediately succeeding the discovery of the art. The famous Polyglot Bible, printed under the patronage of Cardinal Ximenes, was begun in 1502 and was not finished until 1517. The last sheet was carried to Ximenes shortly before his death, when he thanked God that he had lived to see the completion of his greatest work. The edition was limited to 600 copies and cost \$5,000,000. It has now become very scarce. A copy on vellum (of which only three were printed), and supposed to be the identical copy reserved by the cardinal, was sold in 1829 for nearly \$6,000.

A Simcoe County Boneless Boy.

Near Hawkstone, living on the lake shore with his sister, is a boy named Smith, whom it is worth the trouble of our citizens going to see. It is claimed by his folks that he has not a bone in his body at least his bones do not possess the qualities of other people's. He is 17 years old, and about 5 ft. 5 in. long. His mode of progression is similar to that of a snake, his body wriggling from side to side in the same tortuous manner. Laid flat on the floor he can be taken by the feet and rolled up like a ball of cloth, and this does not in any way hurt him. The bones of his arms are equally pliable, and they can be rolled up tightly, commencing with the fingers. A striking peculiarity about his tongue is the elasticity of it. He stretch it out to a length of 15 inches. We understand that young Smith was not always in his present state, and that his elastic condition is becoming more pronounced all the time. His appetite is good, and his sister, who takes care of him, has her hands full in doing so. His intellectual development is not of the highest order, though he is not dull by any means on some subjects. The boy is getting so large now that it is with difficulty that his sister carries him as she used to. When she lifts him he coils his body about her and remains thus until she lets him down. The cause of the condition of this remarkable Hawkstone boy is something none of the relatives can understand. They know that the bones have softened, but can't make out what caused them to. He is certainly the Premier novelty of Simcoe, which boasts of its five-legged calves, two-headed chickens giants and other equally interesting freaks of nature.—Orillia News Letter.

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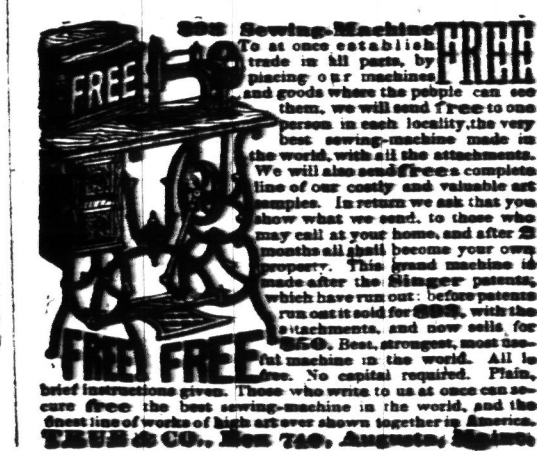
