A CHURN TEST.—There will be a churning match for a wager of \$50 at Simcoe on Saturday next between "The Morning Glory Churn" manufactured by T. E. Morrow & Co., of Jarvis, and the "Daisy" barrel churn, manufactured at London. The match is on time, quantity and quality, and will be held at A. D. Ellis' hardware store, or on the market square, at 11 o'clock a.m. September 7th.

On Thursday night last the store of A. Crysler, Nelles' Corners was entirely destroyed by fire together with most of the contents. The fire, we learn is supposed to have started from a kitchen stove which was in use during the afternoon to heat water for scalding butter tubs. About \$1000 worth of goods were saved. Insurance \$3000 on Stock also a small insurance on building. Peter Reichhelds Hotel just across the road was badly scorched. C. Boyers, barns caught fire several times but were put out before any damage was done.

Dr. May, Government Inspector of Mechanical Institutes for the Province of Ontario, visited the Jarvis Institute on Thursday of last week, and expressed himself as well satisfied with its operation and management. The allowance from the Government, which the Institute will receive this year, will be forwarded in the course of a few weeks, when a new supply of books for the library will be purchased by the directors. But as the year was so far advanced before this Institute was in operation part of the Government allowance for 1889 will not be available till 1890.

Mr. Teitzel, the teacher for the high school class in Jarvis, has arrived and commenced work on Monday. He has at present fully twenty pupils, and a few more are expected. We believe this is the first class of this kind that has ever been formed in Ontario, and all credit is due to the few who, in spite of many obstacles, have shouldered all the responsibility and persevered until they succeeded in making the class an accomplished fact. For the sake of the pupils and for the sake of higher education in Jarvis in years to come it is to be hoped that the experiment will prove a complete success.
