The Election Trial.

CAYUGA, Sept. 3.—(Once again have the factions of Montague and Colter assembled in judicial battle array, and bid fair, by the stubborn hostility displayed on this and previous occasions, to form a date in the political history of Canada rivaling the medieval feud which existed between the Montagues and Capulets. During the ebb and flow in the tide of battle, twice has the doughty doctor been elected and unseated; his opponent at the final innings secured sufficient runs, to enable him to represent Haldimand at the last session of parliament.

Court opened at 10 a. m. sharp, with His Honour Judge Falconbridge on the bench; registrar for the judge, H. J. Wickham. The legal talent consists of Dalton McCarthy, Q.C., assisted by C. G. Snider, counsel for the appellant; while A. B. Aylesworth and A. K. Goodman upheld the cause of C. W. Colter, respondent.

The first witness called upon was Wm. Parker, ex-secretary of the Reform association and at present registrar of the county of Haldimand, who was examined by Dalton McCarthy, Q.C., and questioned regarding the usual method of procedure at the association in selecting candidates and conducting elections, and particulars as to the different meetings held for the purpose of promoting the interest of the party. He testified that Mr. Colter had been connected with the organization since 1879 or 1880, and was always very active in connection with its workings. He spoke of the duties of the treasurer and of the disposition of the fund collected. Witness was also secretary of the Walpole Reform association. Asked regarding the destruction of the minutes of the meetings at which he officiated as secretary, he said the reason was because preceding officials had "disguised" the proceedings of previous meetings, and he was determined to follow the same laudable course by destroying those under his control—some forty pages.

In relation to charge 55, which was to the effect that the male witnesses following had received the sum of \$100 to absent themselves from the polling booth on election day, Counsel McCarthy called for Sol Hurst, Mrs. Hurst and John Hurst, sr. Mrs. Solomon Hurst was the first witness. She lived in Selkirk in the township of Walpole, her husband keeping hotel there. The counsel asked the lady in regard to the sum of \$100 said to have mysteriously come into the possession of her husband during the last election, but she disclaimed any knowledge of the same. Her husband, father-in-law and son found it convenient to visit Buffalo on the day of the election. She knew of no stranger tapping on the window and saying, "Don't fail to get the parcel I left in your cutter," but admitted that there was one left in the drive house. She displayed a state of blissful ignorance in connection with the bundle.

Charges No. 69 and 5 were then taken up. These charges were to the effect that John Rowe, Chas. Honsberger and others offered Charles Sevenpiper \$10 or its equivalent as an inducement for refraining from voting against Mr. Colter. Charles Sevenpiper was then called and testified that before the election he was told to call upon John Rowe, a merchant at Dunnville. He called as desired and was offered \$10 to vote for Colter, and he agreed to accept it at that time. Afterwards Sevenpiper changed his mind and informed Rowe that he would not accept the offer, whereupon Rowe offered him \$10 if he would keep away from the polling place. Sevenpiper also declined this offer.

Some further evidence was taken relative to Mr. R. Honsberger endeavoring to induce witness to vote for Colter and to write to a brother of his in the United States to remain away on election day. Mr. Aylesworth then subjected the witness to a very severe cross-examination, but his evidence was not shaken. A large number of witnesses will be called upon to testify re this charge.

The court adjourned at 6 o'clock this evening and will resume at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

CAYUGA, Sept. 4.—When the court opened at 9.30 this morning, the auditorium was fairly well filled with interested listeners to the proceedings in the contested election case. Counsel for the appellant called Philip Sevenpiper, brother of the last witness, in continuation of the charge that Charles Sevenpiper had been offered \$10 by Ralph Honsberger and William Mowat to spoil his vote. Witness testified to the effect that he knew Ralph Honsberger, Mowat and Miller. He recollected the conversation he heard between his brother and Ralph Honsberger, and corroborated his brother's statement as to what took place between them.

Mr. Aylesworth cross-examined the witness and elicited the opinion that

the conversation that took place between Honsberger and his brother occurred while they were on the floor of the barn, and not while Charles was throwing down fodder, as stated in his evidence. Witness said his brother told him that Honsberger had offered him \$10 to spoil his vote. He told his brother Charles to vote one way or the other and to have nothing to do with the money. With the exception of the conversation episode there was no difference between witness' evidence and that of his brother's.

Ralph Honsberger, sworn, was examined by counsel for appellant. Witness was twenty years old; had Reform sympathies and attended many meetings; witness stated that Robert Miller and Elliot Overholt were prominent Reform politicians in his locality, Rainham Center; didn't know whether John Miller took an active interest or not, but knew that Wm. Mowat did; remember Mowat calling at his father's place last January. He came to buy timber and also to talk about the election; he asked witness how Charles Sevenpiper was, witness said he wanted \$10; Mowat said the next time Sevenpiper did anything about it to ask him if he would take the money; witness spoke of Nicholas Sevenpiper, brother of Charles and Philip, who resided at a distance, but had voted in the former election; in the last he had remained away, presumably because his Conservative friends had not paid his expenses. Witness thought, in consequence, that the Sevenpipers might be converted into Reformers, and told Mowat so, who told witness to ask Chas. Sevenpiper if \$10 would buy him. He expected to get the money from Mowat. The particulars of his visit to Charles Sevenpiper in the latter's barn—as already narrated by previous witnesses—were drawn from the witness at a snail's gallop.

Witness was then cross-examined by Mr. Aylesworth, who elicited nothing further.

Several witnesses were then called to prove the agency of Wm. Mowat but their evidence did not go to show he attended any committee meetings. Timothy Wardell was next sworn. He proved so unsatisfactory in the manner in which he answered questions and insisted upon making rambling statements that the Judge committed him to jail until to-morrow morning. On account of this it was found necessary to abandon charges No. 69 and 5 for the present.

Charge No. 82 was then gone into. It alleges that James Haslett and others, agent of the respondent, gave Henry Brydges \$5 to enable him to absent himself from the polling place. After some evidence had been taken James Haslett was called and denied that he had offered Brydges \$5.

CAYUGA, Aug. 6.—The fourth day's proceedings in the Haldimand contested election trial opened at 9.30 this morning. The consideration of charge 14, relating to the sending of a bogus telegram, was continued, the examination of Daniel McMullen, the telegraph operator at Caledonia, who received the message, being resumed. Witness explained to petitioner's counsel the various marks on the telegram and swore that the mark purporting to be the initial of the sender at Simcoe was authentic to the best of his belief. On his oath he had known nothing at the time of the trick that he had played. The message alleged to have been received early in the morning from Jarvis for Hines, the witness swore, did not actually arrive at the early hour stated. He couldn't explain the strange coincidence that the Simcoe office hours that morning. His own opinion was that the bogus letter came from Jarvis. Hines, the receiver of the first message from Jarvis, was a Reformer, as was also witness and his father. Hines was an active partisan. Couldn't say whether the message had been concocted between Hines in Caledonia and his brother Dan of Jarvis.

Cross-examination revealed nothing of a very material nature.

The Court arose at 10.40 this evening to sit at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, Saturday at 2 p. m.

The argument as to three of the charges in the Haldimand election case was held Monday morning before Mr. Justice Falconbridge at Osgoode Hall. Mr. A. B. Aylesworth, Q.C., appeared for the respondent, and Mr. Dalton McCarthy, Q.C., for the appellants.

Mr. Justice Falconbridge announced that judgment would be given yesterday at 11 a. m. at the Assize Court.

The customs returns for August were: \$41,563; duty \$8,550.59, as compared with the corresponding month in 1888: \$321.67, duty \$6040.30, showing an increase this year of \$12,156 in value and \$2 510.29 in duty. In 1887 the duty collected during the month of August was \$3,149.86, showing an increase of double the amount of duty collected.
