THE TUNNEL.-Since the slide and sinking of the earth at the tunnel, work has been a sort of new deal in the matter of how the work shall be done as for as getting things in shape for the shield to commence operations on the tunnel proper. After getting down 50 feet or so the clay is treacherous, as one man put it the clay seems to be alive. It is spongy, etc., and that is what caused the sinking of the earth. The west end of the excavation where the sinking took place has been filled in and a greater slope given to the bank. The same is done on the south side of the excavation, and on the north side, the bank has been cut away so as to give a better slope. The hole for the shield will be built on a different principle—somewhat experimental—and it is purposed that it shall be crib work. It thought that in this manner the treacherous clay will be controlled. It will be quite a little while vet before the shield commences operations. The shaft which was put down so successfully near the river by Stokes Bres., for tunnel drainage purposes is now at a depth of 112 feet—at the rock. The iron casting extends to about the top. This shaft is about 100 feet south of where the tunnel will go through, and will be connected with it by a drift, the water running through the latter into the shaft and then being pumped out. The work on the American side is progressing rapidly no trouble being experienced.—Sarnia Observer.
