The strike at Liverpool is ended, the employers having conceded the advance demanded.

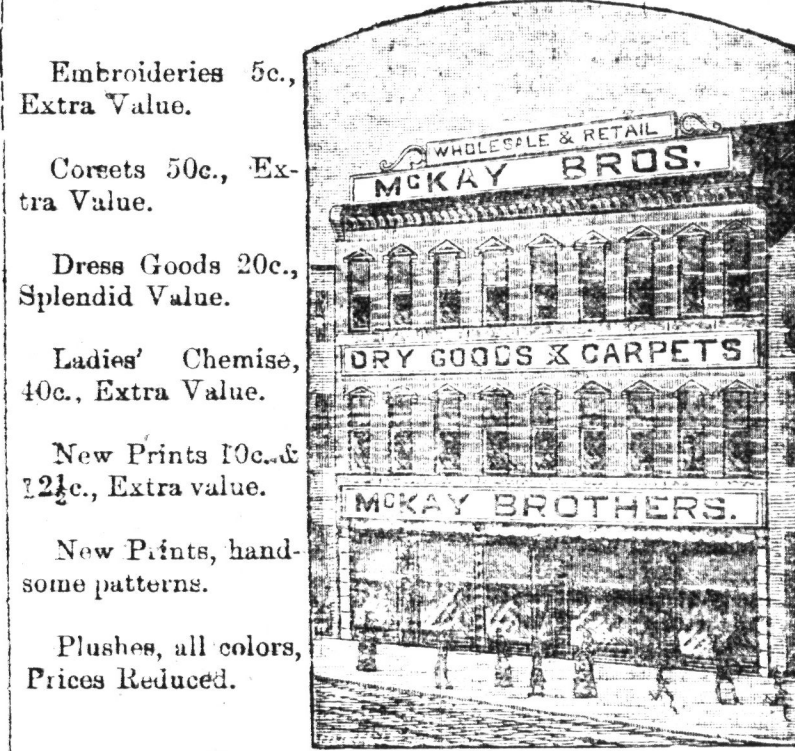
