DROWNED.—A sad drowning accident happened at Waterford on Sunday week, about 12 o'clock. A boy named Wm. Farrar, aged about 14 years, together with a younger brother and one or two other boys about their own ages, went up to what is known as the "Brooklyn," just above the station, for a swim, and while in young Farrar got out beyond his depth, and being unable to swim, went down. His younger brother tried to save him, and the drowning lad caught him by the foot, but fortunately the brother managed to release himself from his grasp or he too would probably have met a like fate. The boys gave the alarm as quickly as possible after getting some of their clothes on, and the first man to arrive was Mr. Wm. Smith, who was watching an engine on the B. W. & L. E., a little farther west, but being unable to swim and the water deep, he immediately informed the men at the ice-house, who at once repaired to the spot, and Mr. Arthur Saylor after diving twice succeeded in securing the body.
