ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

The Bank of England has reduced its rate of discount from 3½ to 3 per cent.

The Montreal City Council has decided to place its new loan in London, Eng. Emperor William has subscribed 10,000 marks for a monument to Emperor Frederick at Diesterweg.

It is expected that the Governor-General will open the annual spring exhibition of paintings in the Montreal Art Gallery on the 24th inst.

Prof. Tyndall, in a recent speech, said that politically he opposed Mr. Gladstone to the teeth, but to save Mr. Gladstone's life he would risk his own at any moment.

The widow of an army officer in Moscow, who was in dire poverty, locked herself up in a room the other day with her five children and turned on the gas, and all six were suffocated.

The Louisiana Lottery Company offers to pay the State \$1,250,000 in annual payments of \$50,000 for the renewal of its charter for 25 years from 1895, when the present charter expires.

A strong resolution was passed Thursday at the meeting of the Presbyterian Synod at Cornwall, declaring that the time had come when Parliament should pass a prohibitory law for the whole Dominion.

The employees of the United States Express Company have been notified that their salaries will be reduced ten per cent, on May 1st, and the salaries of the president, vice-presidents, and superintendents will be reduced twenty per cent.

The Printing Committee of the Dominion Parliament decided that a complete set of the statutes and of the votes and proceedings of the Parliament since Confederation be presented to the library of Toronto University.

A line is being constructed from Deming to Topolobampo, in Mexico, at which point a line of steamers will run to China and Japan, shortening the distance between those countries and New York by 800 miles, or a saving of two days.

The Constellations in April.

The constellation of the Great Bear is overheard in April evenings, and on the opposite side of the Pole star is Cassiopeia following her husband, Cepheus, with their daughter, Andromeda, and the gallant knight, Perseus, close to them, the group forming a very fair picture of a rocking chair. In the southern sky Hydra, the great sea serpent, occupies the most prominent position. When this constellation was first formed the serpent extended along the equator, and was probably taken to represent the great serpent which was supposed to gird round the ocean, and to which we are no doubt indebted for the annual visitor so mysteriously appearing and disappearing of our own coast. The constellation Crater, or "The Cup," is supposed to represent a damaged claret cup, and although now somewhat tilted, was at one time in an upright, wine-holding position. It has been regarded as the original goblet out of which Noah first took his wine. The Sickle, in constellation of Leo, is very plainly marked by the bright star Regulus, and is in a very interesting section of the heavens, as from this quarter radiates the shower of meteors which make the November skies so brilliant. In the east we have the constellation of Bootes, the Herdsman, marked by the very bright star Arcturus, easily found by extending the handle of the Dipper. In the western skies Taurus is passing away toward the right. The glorious Orion is going too fast toward his setting place, over which the starry Gemini shine so gloriously, and as they sink below the western horizon they take with them Sirius, the brightest twinkler of them all, and Procyon his more humble companion.

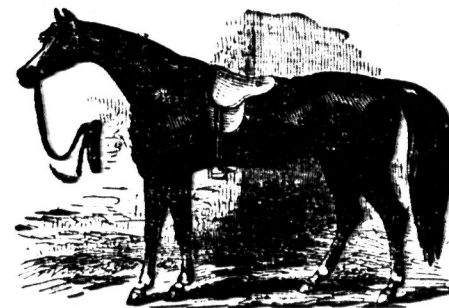
