The children of Wm. Nicholson, a farmer living about four miles west of Hagersville, were playing in the garden on Saturday afternoon, April 12th, when they found a quantity of what they supposed to be carrots. The whole family, the parents and four children, had eaten of them when a boy aged about ten was taken suddenly ill and died a few minutes later in terrible agony. By this time they were all feeling very ill, and the truth dawned on them that they had eaten wild parsnip. An antidote, such as could be prepared at the moment, was administered, and the physician sent for. The oldest daughter aged 13 is still very ill, and doubts are entertained of her recovery. The remainder of the family are progressing favorably.

Another has been added to the list of incendiary fires that have disgraced Simcoe during the past twelve months. Fortunately the attempt was unsuccessful this time. About 8 o'clock Sunday morning smoke was seen issuing from the foundry in the North ward owned and now operated by John Algoo. On entering it was seen that the fire had been started through a broken pane in one of the west windows. A large hole was burnt through the floor and cross beams. From the nature of the surroundings it made little progress, and had probably been burning slowly for hours before being discovered. No. 2 steamer was promptly brought out but not needed. Burnt matches were found outside under the window, showing plainly how and where the miscreant had applied the fire. The damage is slight owing to the prompt response of the fire brigade.
