> The customs returns for the twelve months ending June 30 have been made up. The exports reach the grand total of\$94,389.945, as compared with \$86,014.580 hast year, an increase of \$8,375,365. This is better than any year since 1883, and in fact has only been exceeded in three previous years since confederation, viz.: 1881, 1882, 1883. It will be several weeks before the final returns of imports are known, but the value of goods entered for home consumption in the twelve months exclusive of British Columbia, was \$107,969,470 as against \$105,403,446 an an increase of two millions and a half. The duty collected was \$22,814,703 an increase of \$75,722.

In the old "shilling" times in New York State, says the Press, there was a standing quarrel between the housewife and the groceryman as to who should have the half cent when a quarter of a pound of butter at a shilling a pound. The "quarter" was two shillings "York money," and half of it would be twelve and a half cents. The groceryman who returned twelve cents' change kept thiateen cents for the butter instead of the twelve and a half which would be cent extra profit saw his customers gradually leaving him, and going to his kated rival across the street who always returned thirteen cents in exchange when a "two-shilling piece" was presented in payment for a shill-
