### CURRENT NOTES.

The election to the seat for Kent in the House of Commons, made vacant by the resignation of Judge Landry, resulted in the return of Leyer by about 400 plurality. There were three candidates, all of whom were Government supporters.

The action of the United States Senate in laying aside the tariff bill for the present and taking up other business is not promising for Mr. McKinley's measure. There is a good deal of hesitation to know exactly what to do in view of the free sugar proposal of Mr. Blaine. The views of that statesman are being weighed, and hence the delay in passing the measure. The opinion prevails that a disposition is growing to allow Mr. Blaine to do his best to secure trade privileges in return before the sugar duties are abolished. He will require time for that, and time is not on the side of the McKinley bill.

The clergy of the Russian Church are divided into two classes, according to their means of sustenance. One portion receives their regular salaries; the other have to work in the fields which the Church apportions to them, and to depend on the gifts and collections from their parishioners. The latter are known as the "white" clergy. Now the Synod is working out a plan for putting the entire clergy on regular salaries, and abolishing the system of church collection. The sum of \$2,541,600 roubles will be required annually for the salaries of the "white" clergy, which will be graded according to their respective offices. A special tax will be imposed upon the "orthodox" to raise that sum.

The order from the Inland Revenue Department requiring the destruction of cigar boxes as soon as their contents have been sold was loudly complained against by the small dealers, their plea being that the empty boxes were used by them to fill up vacant shelves and give them the appearance of carrying a large stock. Several of these having complained to the commissioner that the order was rather a hardship to them, that official replied:—"Well, just knock the bottoms out of the boxes and keep them if you wish." Mr. Miall informed an Empire correspondent that this treatment of empty cigar boxes would be considered a compliance with the law.

Search lights of high candle power are being installed on many ocean steamers for the purpose of detecting icebergs and other obstacles in foggy weather, or on dark nights and the dangers of ocean travel will thus be materially reduced. A few years ago the passage through the Suez Canal would occupy three or four days, although the distance is only eighty-eight miles. In consequence of the narrowness of the canal and the wash of waves caused by rapid progression, the speed of vessels is limited to five miles an hour. Now the trip is accomplished in 24 hours. A powerful search light is placed on a platform specially rigged up for the purpose in front of the bow of the vessel and about five feet above the water line. The charge for the use of the apparatus is fixed at such a moderate rate that the owner of the vessel finds the time saved to have been cheaply purchased.

### The Babies of the World.

THE CRADLES OF A SINGLE YEAR WOULD ENCIRCLE THE EARTH.  
St. Louis Republic.

It has been computed that between 36,000,000 and 37,000,000 babies are born in the world each year. The rate of production, is therefore, about seventy per minute, more than one for every beat of the clock. With the one a-minute calculation every newspaper is familiar, but it is not every one who stops to calculate what this means when it comes to a year's supply. It will, therefore, startle a good many people to find, on the authority of a well-known hospital writer, that could the infants of a year be arranged in a line in cradles, the cradles would be overflowing and at the same time extend around the earth.

The same writer looks at the matter in a still more picturesque light. He imagines the babies being carried past a given point in their mother's arms, one by one, and the procession being kept up night and day until the last of the year, the babies that had passed by. A sufficient liberal rate is allowed, but even in going past at the rate of twenty a minute the reviewer at his post would only have seen the sixth part of this infantile host after they had been passing him at the rate of 1,200 an hour during the entire year. In other words, the babe that had to be carried when the tramp began would be able to walk when but a mere fraction of its comrades had passed the reviewer's post, and when the year's supply of babies was drawing to a close there would be a rearguard, not of infants, but of romping six-year-old boys and girls.

The town of Moor, in Hungary, has been almost destroyed by fire.

Plenty of whitefish are being caught at the lower end of Lake Ontario.

T. J. Kennedy, a Thorold tailor, drowned himself at Merriton Friday.

Okla-homa has apparently elected a Republican Territorial Legislature.

A \$7,000 fire occurred at Portage la Prairie Friday.

Samuel B. Horne, of Connecticut, has been appointed U. S. Consul at St. Thomas.

Damage to the Southern Pacific Railway in Arizona by washouts is estimated at \$150,000.

Fred. Rounds, a farmer near Welland, was killed last week by the wheel of his binder going over him.

It is stated that the reports of damage to crops in Manitoba by hailstorms have been greatly exaggerated.

By the runaway at Regina of a police team of bronchos an officer had one leg broken, a corporal both of his shoulders broken, while the driver is suffering from concussion of the brain.

In the second day's racing of the North-Western regatta at Detroit Wednesday, the Toronto Club's crew won the senior four-oared race, while J. J. Ryan of the same club, won the senior single-scull race.

A fire has destroyed the larger part of the wonderful forests on Mount Athos, the holy mountain of the Greek Church. Several monasteries have been destroyed and twenty monks' and hermits perished in the flames.

An order has been issued by Mr. Robideaux, Provincial Secretary of Quebec, that all the Protestant patients of Longue Pointe Asylum can be transferred to the new Protestant hospital in Montreal by order of their relatives or friends.

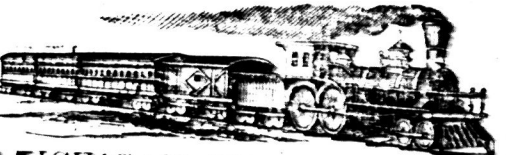
