A General Epitome of Events of the Week.

ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

Two Swiss gentlemen have succeeded in making the ascent of Mount St. Donald in the Canadian Rockies.

Another mutiny has occurred in England, part of the garrison at Chatham objecting to the course of their sergeants.

There will be no exhibition in Montreal this year, as the buildings are occupied by the patients of Longue Pointe Asylum.

Three car loads of silk from China passed through Ottawa on Wednesday night on the Canadian Pacific railway en route for New York.

The notary public at Thousand Island Park has just discovered that for a year past he has been swearing witnesses upon a pocket dictionary.

The report of the liquidators of the Panama Canal Company shows the total expenditure to be \$313,000,000, and the assets on March 3 were \$16,000,000.

A by-law submitted to the citizens of Kingston Thursday, asking for \$11,400 to build and equip a new fire hall, was over-whelmingly defeated.

The trial of the Quebec protested election cases, of which there are ten, six Ministerial and four Opposition, has been postponed until after the summer vacation.

Negotiations in favor of peace between San Salvador and Guatemala are progressing favourably, and will undoubtedly be concluded before the end of the week.

A despatch from Calgary says the Mormons of Southern Alberta are exerting a most pernicious influence on the Blood Indians by circulating the doctrine of polygamy.

Emperor William has received a mysterious warning to be careful of himself on his visit to Russia, and to avoid as much as possible too close contact with the Czar.

The story telegraphed to Washington from New York that 24 sailors escaped from British ships have been captured on American soil is not credited at the State Department. If such has occurred it will be regarded as a serious breach of international law.

A piano teacher has been arrested in Buda-Pesth for selling young girls, his pupils, to rich old men in South America and Constantinople for immoral purposes. He got the girls to their destination under the pretence that they were getting musical employment.

The deputation of New York State masters now at Washington is making a hard fight to have the duty on barley cut down to fifteen cents, and its members still have some hope of succeeding.

The steamer Lake Nepigon Wednesday in turning ran into the barque Isabel, lying at one of the Quebec wharves, and cut that vessel completely in two. The Isabel sunk ten minutes afterwards, carrying down with her a large cargo of sugar and molasses. No lives were lost.

In order to supply Manitoba farmers with the 4,000 additional harvesters which it is said they will require, Labor excursions from Ontario, with the fare fixed at \$28 for the trip to Winnipeg and return, have been arranged to start from Toronto on the 13th and 20th insts.

Rev. A. L. Therin, a French Protestant clergyman, of Montreal, calls attention to an attack that was made upon a French family recently converted to the Baptist Church. According to Mr. Therin, the mob was led in its attack by a cousin of the parish priest mounted on a horse.

The failure of the fruit crop is attributed to a blight that has struck the trees, known as fire blight. Where touched by it the branches seem burned. It is said by horticulturists that this will work its way through the tree, and ultimately destroy it, unless checked, and the only way to do this is to at once prune off the burned or dead branches.

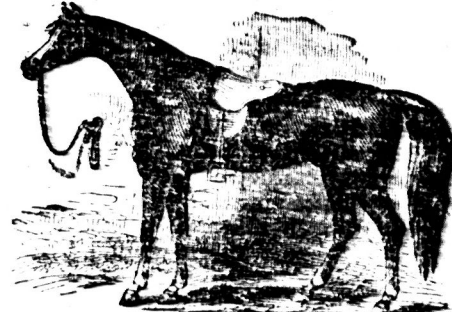
