Nearly 2,000 Grand Army excursionists, en route from Chicago to Boston, took steamers at Kingston on Saturday and sailed down the St. Lawrence to Montreal.

Telegrams have been sent from Winnipeg by persons interested in bulling wheat, stating that frost had visited Manitoba on Friday night. The statement is untrue.

The flour and cornmeal mill of C. Macdonnell & Sons, Collingwood, was destroyed by fire Sunday morning. Loss, \$35,000; insurance on mill \$17,000, on stock \$5,000.

The Norwegian barque Gerda struck on Sable island on the 27th ult. and became a total wreck. The crew were saved and will be forwarded to Halifax on the first opportunity.

The result of the threshing of the wheat crop has been a disappointment to Ohio farmers. The indications are that only from 60 to 75 per cent. of an average crop can be realized.

The citizens of New Westminster, B. C., will protest against the granting of permission to Capt. Whitelaw, a United States citizen, to kill whales in the gulf of Georgia, on the ground that a new steel steamer has just been constructed for the same purpose at New Westminster.

A colored woman called at the Brunswick, Ga., telegraph office, and had dictated the following message to her son: "Are you dead? Answer to your loving mother, Susie Louisiana Thomas. That was a queer message, but it was sent. The next day the answer came back. It said: "Not dead, but alive. Will let you know when I die."

Kemmler, the murderer, was executed by electricity Wednesday at Auburn, N. Y. being the first victim under the new law. "Electrocution," as exemplified in his case, was not an entire success. A powerful charge was applied for eighteen seconds and then cut off. In a few minutes there were signs of reviving consciousness, when the current was again applied and continued till a hole was burned into the man's back near the spine, and death was unmistakable.
