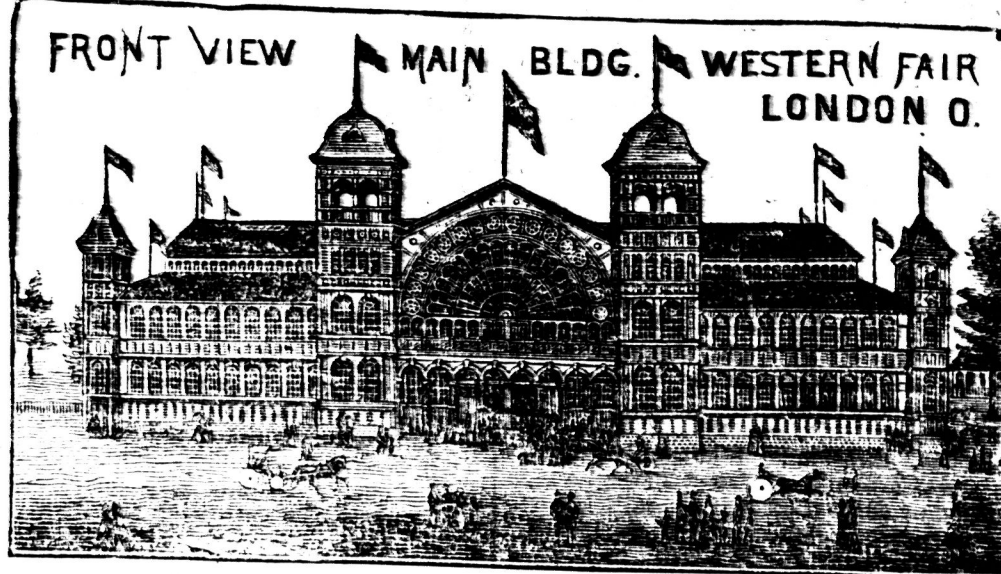

In drawing the attention of our readers to the advertisement in this issue of the Western Fair, which takes place at London, Sept. 18th to 27th, we might remark that those who attended their last Fair, in 1888, were no doubt surprised and delighted with the architectural and picturesque appearance presented by the buildings and grounds, as well as the large number and quality of the exhibits and attractions.

This year the directors are doubling their efforts to make the Fair more attractive and instructive than ever. The prize list has been improved in the Agricultural, Horticultural, Live Stock and Poultry Departments, and special attention is being directed to the Main Building, which will be supplied with shifting exhibitors to manufacture goods in view of the public, thus proving a source of instruction and entertainment.

They have also arranged for several special exhibits from the Agricultural Fairs of the Dominion, Ontario, Manitoba and Northwest Territories, and the Indians of Ontario, but one that will be more interesting perhaps owing to its rarity (not having been shown in Canada before), is that of the Southern Inter-State Immigration Bureau, representing 14 of the United States. This exhibit consists of growing cotton; figs as they grow on the bush; rice as it grows in the fields of the Carolinas; peanuts as they are taken from the ground in Virginia; products of the turpentine stumps of Georgia; carpets made

### A Forgotten Murder Recalled.

DID CARDINAL SMITH KILL MARIE COLVILLE? HE WILL HAVE TO ANSWER TO THE CHARGE AT ALL EVENTS.

In December of the year 1884, residents of this County will remember, that the decomposed remains of a young woman were found in the Cedar Swamp in the Township of Townsend, lying east of the village of Bloomburg. The affair attracted some attention at the time, as it was made very clear that the unfortunate girl had been murdered.

Her name it was ascertained was Marie Colville and her home had been in Chelonia. The government offered a liberal reward for the conviction of her slayer but no arrest was made, though there was a good deal of idle talk floating around implicating one Cardinal Smith, a notorious character, who had been keeping a disreputable room in the vicinity of Jarvis, with some complicity in the crime.

The excitement however soon died out and poor Marie Colville was apparently left to lie unavenged and forgotten.

It would seem by recent developments, however, that one person had not been discouraged at the difficulty of clearing up the mystery of her death.

Lemuel Kitchen a farmer who lives near the spot where her remains were found had seen shortly before their discovery Smith and the young woman driving through the swamp, and he at least was certain that Smith knew more than he cared to tell.

From that time until the present he has not ceased his vigilance. Gathering up a thread of evidence here and another there he now claims to have woven a coil of testimony around Smith that will lead to his conviction. What he may know of course is not yet public property but he has at least satisfied Magistrate Kitchen who issued a warrant on Thursday last.

Constable Clarke made the arrest near Hagersville and on Friday night Smith was a prisoner in Simcoe jail charged with the murder of Marie Colville. - Reformer, Simcoe.

Cleveland cigarmakers, to the number of 400, are on strike.

One death from cholera was reported in Madrid Sunday.

Four murders were reported in Abbeyville county, S. C. last week.

J. A. Jameson, a New York millionaire, hung himself Sunday.

The Great Falls railway is finished to within 100 miles of Lethbridge.

Hon. Mr. Bowell, Minister of Customs, has gone to New Brunswick on official business.

Mrs. Henry E. Dixey, wife of the actor, has brought suit for separation against her husband.

J. Lewis Linn, a wealthy resident of New Haven, Conn., killed himself with morphine in a Detroit hotel on Saturday.

The Northern Pacific and Manitoba railway has been leased for a hundred years to the Northern Pacific Company.

John D. Rockefeller, the oil magnate, denies that he is to endow a \$20,000,000 national university to New York.

It has been decided to partially restore the Notre Dame cathedral, Paris, beginning with the sculptures in the Rue Cloitre.

The SS. Ashcroft, lumber laden, from Montreal to Grimsby, Eng., is ashore at Cape Rice. There is no hope of getting her off.

The thermometer reached the freezing point in three places in Manitoba on Saturday night, but reports state that no damage was done.

Only 300 feet remain to be completed in the St. Clair river tunnel and if no delay occurs the two shields should meet within the next ten days.

Mr. Sanford Fleming, C. E. estimates that the cost of the proposed Pacific cable between Canada, New Zealand and Australia will be \$1,800,000.

The mounted police, at the request of the Government, report that 400,000 acres of land have been broken and cropped within 30 miles of Calgary.

A drunken machinist named Smith threw his wife down stairs at their home in Montreal Sunday night. The woman died before medical aid could be summoned.

At St. Eustache, Man., on Saturday night, Henry Boudin, aged 19, placed a heavily loaded rifle to his mouth and killed himself instantly. Part of his head was blown off.

The limited Kansas City express on the Missouri Pacific was held up by seven highwaymen at Ottumwa, Mo., early Sunday evening and robbed of \$90,000 of express matter.

A letter from the U. S. treasury department, a copy of which has been sent to a Canadian manufacturing firm, states that the bonding privileges which Canada enjoys will soon be abrogated.
