Russia will make a material reduction in her army after the summer manoeuvres.

Recent reports from the Lower Provinces and the Gulf show that the fisheries are improving.

The thirty-sixth annual session of the Independent Order of Oddfellows opened in Toronto Wednesday.

The freeholders of the town of Niagara voted in favor of a system of waterworks Tuesday.

Fruit is being imported by Winnipeg from California, the importations occupying six days in transit.

The next session of the High Court of Foresters will convene on the second Tuesday in August next in Brockville.

Arthur Day, the man accused of murdering his wife at Niagara Falls, has been placed in Welland goal to await his trial.

It is rumoured that the Czar intends to intervene on behalf of the oppressed in Armenia, but is waiting to discuss the matter with Emperor William.

Mr. Shannon, the Dublin solicitor of the London Times, who was connected with the Pigott scandal and who mysteriously disappeared about the time of Pigott's suicide, has returned to his home.

Capt. William Wilkinson, a British army officer, who fought in the Peninsula and was present at Waterloo, died at the age of 97 in Windsor on Monday evening.

In the first-class band competition in Hamilton Tuesday the Grenadiers of Toronto got the first prize, the Musical Society band of Waterloo the second, and the 29th Battalion band of Berlin the third.

Fall wheat is much below the average, and while spring wheat has turned out better than expected, and will be a fair average crop, it is affected with rust in some localities. Barley is a good average in quantity, but the color is in many places bad. Owing to the drought the root crops are below the average. Apples and peaches are a failure, but grapes promise well.

The Dominion Government will shortly spend \$7,000 in further improvements to Belleville harbor.

A serious strike of the men employed in the shipping trade and on the railways in New Zealand is imminent.

A bill adding Heligoland to Prussia will be presented to the Reichstag next autumn. The next budget will ask a large credit for fortifying the island.

The steamer Tenoride arrived in New York Wednesday, having made the passage from Queenstown in 5 days, 19 hours, and five minutes, beating the City of Paris' best western trip by thirteen minutes.

A party of Canadian and American Indians have taken possession of Garden Island, in Lake of the Woods, and fears are expressed that the whites in charge of the fishing stations will be massacred.

The Dominion Government recently attached the barns and other property of settlers at Lake Dauphin, Manitoba, for non-payment of timber dues. The settlers have sent a protest to the Minister of the Interior.

On Wednesday afternoon John Callan, Jr., a Glanford farmer, fell from a load of grain, and the wheels of the wagon passed over his body, crushing him to death. He died almost instantly. The deceased was thirty-five years old, and unmarried.

A sad accident occurred at St. Thomas about one o'clock Thursday evening. Mr. John Doyle, a wholesale liquor dealer, and a prominent citizen for the last ten years, was run over by a yard engine at the Michigan Central depot, and had his right arm cut nearly off at the shoulder, his left hand badly crushed, and was cut about the head and legs. He was carried to the Wilkes house, and Drs. McElroy and Fulton summoned. The doctors found it necessary to amputate the right arm at once. Mr. Doyle now lies in a critical condition, but hopes are entertained of his recovery.

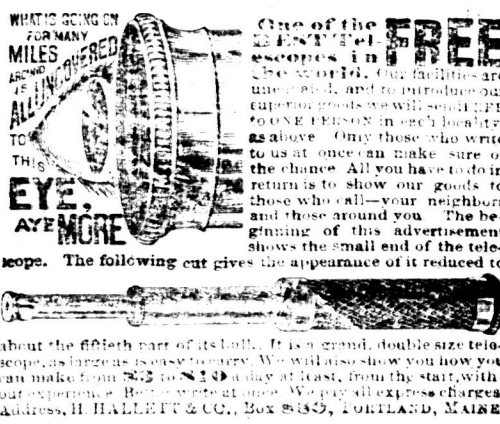
