## NEWS FROM ALL POINTS.

### A General Epitome of Events of the Week.

There are now five insane persons in  
the Belleville gaol.

On Saturday the Czar and Emperor  
William arrived at the Peterhof palace.  
At Brandon men are obtaining \$55  
per month for work in the harvest  
field.

Oats were placed on the market in  
North-Western Manitoba on Friday  
morning.

The Queen's hotel at Sundridge was  
burnt Monday, and two men perished  
in the flames.

Lethbridge in the Canadian North-  
west, will soon be connected with Great  
Falls, Montana, by rail.

A party of Jews from the persecuted  
communities in Europe have arrived at  
Quebec in the steamship Oregon.

Cholera is making headway through-  
out Japan despite the efforts of the  
Government to arrest its progress.

It is believed that the Southern  
Illinois coal miners will strike on Sept.  
1st for an advance in their wages.

A brigand chief in Cuba exacts tri-  
bute from the railways by threatening to  
wreck their trains if he is refused.

The Irish hay crop is ruined, and the  
condition of the cereals and the turf is  
bad. One death is reported from eating  
dismal potatoes.

A young man named John Seymour  
was drowned at the Eastern Gap at  
Toronto on Saturday by the upsetting  
of a sail boat.

The Earl of Aberdeen, who is visiting  
Canada, has telegraphed his willingness  
to formally open the Toronto Industrial  
Exhibition.

Advices from Samoa state that the  
consuls at Apia have warned the natives  
against entering into any intrigues to  
replace King Mitaafa.

The New York Brick Manufacturers'  
Association has decided not to sell any  
bricks in those districts affected by the  
strike in the building trade.

Mr. Mackenzie Bowell, Minister of  
Customs, and Mr. Parnelle, Assistant  
Commissioner of Customs, will shortly  
make an official tour through Manitoba.

A killing frost is reported in Kitch-  
en, Marshall, Norman, and Polk counties.  
Minor rip all the border counties of  
Northern Dakota and Manitoba west-  
ward to Minnesota.

An association for the colonization of  
Palestine has been successfully estab-  
lished in the Jewish quarter of London,  
and ship loads of poor Jews are being  
sent to the Holy Land.

During the absence of its mother her  
infant was seized by an idiot, living  
near Buckleigh in Que., who devoured  
its face and breast, causing injuries  
from which death almost immediately  
ensued.

Crop reports published in Winnipeg  
indicate that the damage from the re-  
cent frosts was very slight. The quan-  
tity of the wheat in some districts will be  
affected, but in no instance will there  
be any diminution in the quantity.

Saturday forenoon a young man  
named Stanley Hughes, while working  
on a threshing machine on the farm of  
Mr. Stephen Hight, two miles from  
Picton, had his leg badly mangled up  
to the thigh in the cylinder of the  
machine. He died in two hours.

In a special dispatch M. Camille  
Flammarion, the distinguished French  
astronomer, says the recent storm at  
Oroux was not a cyclone, or the result  
of the atmospheric electrical disturbance  
which has marked this summer the most  
remarkable of the century.

On Saturday morning about 2 o'clock  
the building of the Journal-Courier in M.  
factory at Paris was discovered to be  
on fire. It was an old fire building,  
and by the time the fire brigade arrived  
it was wrapped in flames. It was a  
total loss, except the engine, which was  
not much injured. Loss, \$2,300; insur-  
ance \$1,500.

Some excitement was created in Lon-  
don by the statement that one of the  
nurses in attendance on Robert Teigh  
had caught the Asiatic cholera from  
which he was suffering, and was dead.  
A special despatch corrects this, showing  
that the victim was a girl of five, not  
in any way connected with the sailor,  
and that her death was probably caused  
by English cholera of a malignant  
type.

Dr. Carman, of New York, and Mr.  
E. Hopkins, of Hamilton, went fishing  
in a small stream near Burk's Falls on  
Friday and returned after six hours'  
absence with 150 splendid speckled  
trout, all good-sized fish, the largest  
weighing about two pounds. They  
report the streams full of fish and nu-  
merous fishing parties have returned  
with well-filled baskets.

At Maisau, Austria, lightning struck  
a railway train and threw twenty  
trucks down the embankment.

The infant child of Benjamin Norwich  
was drowned Sunday by its carriage  
rolling off Brock street wharf at Toronto.

Mr. John T. Moore, Inspector of In-  
land Revenue for New Brunswick, died  
suddenly on Friday night of paralysis  
of the brain.

Handan and Hamm, the oarsmen,  
nearly came to blows in Kansas City  
over the proposed race between the  
former and Gaudaur.

At Brighton Beach Monday Tenny  
made an unsuccessful attempt to beat  
Ten Brock's mile record of 1:30. The  
distance was run in 1:40.

A pensioner named Hamilton, resid-  
ing in Kingston, fell head first into a  
culvert in that city Monday evening,  
and being immediately rendered in-  
sensible was drowned.

The clergy and laity of the Deanery  
of Windsor are preparing for a grand  
farewell reception to be given to Bishop  
O'Connor on the eve of his depart-  
ure for London.

The tunnel under the St. Clair river  
was opened Monday from end to end  
and Mr. Joseph Robson passed through.  
The work was inspected yesterday by  
Sir Henry Tyler, president, and Sir  
Joseph Hickson, manager, of the Grand  
Trunk railway.

Michael Dumas, who was one of the  
leaders in the late rebellion in the North-  
West, believes that General Middleton  
has been ill-treated by the Canadian  
people, and thinks it was the General's  
subordinates who did the looting com-  
plained of. He further states that the  
school question will exercise consid-  
erable influence in the next elections in  
Manitoba.

Holzhey, the train robber and murder-  
er confined in Marquette, Mich.,  
prison, whose attempt to starve himself  
to death was frustrated by the injection  
of food, got hold of a scrap of galvanized  
iron Monday and cut the artery in his  
wrist, besides trying to dash his brains  
out against the wall. He was almost  
dead when found, and was put in a  
straight jacket after his wounds had  
been dressed.

A. S. Stillwell, Robert Boughner and  
Joseph Bell, of the village of Eden, town-  
ship of Bayham, have been committed  
to St. Thomas on the charge of setting  
fire to the Eden Hotel on the morning  
of the 15th inst., when the hotel and  
barns were entirely consumed, occasion-  
ing a loss of \$4,000. Franklin Grey  
lessee of the hotel, swore that he saw  
the three prisoners coming out of the  
barn while it was burning, carrying  
two coal oil cans.

WINDSOR, Aug. 23.—Mayor Sel White  
of Windsor, is authority for the state-  
ment that a wagon and passenger  
tunnel will be built under the Black  
River at Port Huron, and from a point  
in Port Huron to be determined upon,  
to the Canadian shore at Sarnia. The  
principal stockholders will be Mayor  
Kenney, and W. H. Anderson, of Port  
Huron, and Mayor White. Mayor White  
says: "Next spring will probably see  
ground broken, as we want to avail  
ourselves of the materials used in the  
construction of the railway tunnel be-  
tween Port Huron and Sarnia."

An old journalist writes as follows:  
"You can size up a business man by his  
attitude to the newspapers of his place.  
If he is of a certain size, he will regard  
the newspapers as equally important  
with railways, and equally necessary to  
the people's prosperity. He will recog-  
nize the serious of things a newspaper  
does for which it can not receive direct  
remuneration. He will think out rea-  
sons for advertising rather than reasons  
for not doing so. If he is of the other  
calibre he will begin to calculate whe-  
ther, after all, he mightn't save 50 cents  
by getting out a few circulars instead  
of advertising? He acknowledges the  
press as a modern necessity, but his  
acknowledgment is in words only.  
Were the souls of all business men of  
the size of his there would be no news-  
papers."
