ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

An Imperial ukase has been issued in St. Petersburg increasing the duty on Sugar.

The French are preparing for another expedition against Dahomey, which will begin in October.

The trouble at Lake of the Woods is over, the Indians departing quietly for their homes after promising not to molest the fishermen again.

The Canadian Pacific railway has given out contracts for 1,000 box cars, to be ready the first week in October, for the purpose of adequately moving the season's crops.

A correspondent of the Montreal L'Etendard has been trying to find out how many St. Annes there are in this country. He enumerates 41, and is sure these are not all.

A third crop bulletin issued by the Manitoba Government states that the wheat yield of the province will reach twenty million bushels, and that oats will average 44 bushels per acre and barley 34.

The Northern Pacific Railway Company has invited the Aldermen of Winnipeg and the leading merchants of that city, as well as of Portage la Prairie and Brandon, to a trip to Duluth and St. Paul this week.

Sir Joseph Hickson left Montreal Wednesday for New York to meet Sir Henry Tyler, president of the Grand Trunk railway, who is coming out to be present at the opening of the great International tunnel at Windsor.

At the meeting of the Grand Orange Lodge in St. John, N. B. last week, Mr. Clarke Wallace, M.P. was re-elected grand master; Mayor Clarke, of Toronto deputy grand; and Mr. Robert Birmingham, grand secretary.

The Wesleyan Theological College in Montreal has been presented with copies of three of the oldest and most valuable manuscript of the Greek Testament, known as the Codex Sinaiticus, the Codex Vaticanus, and the Codex Alexandrinus.

The return of the Rev. Abbe Pronix, vice-rector of Laval, from Rome has revived the university amalgamation question in Montreal. Although the Rev., seems pleased with the result of his journey, the belief prevails that the amalgamation of the universities is as remote as ever.

Mrs. Stedman, an elderly woman, residing at Little York, near Toronto, is held on a charge of having attempted to administer poison to her two grandchildren, aged eight and five years. She is accused of having tried to induce the children to swallow a quantity of paris green spread over bread and butter.

Frost appeared in North-Western Manitoba Thursday morning, but no damage to crops has been reported.

The remains of the old Desjardins canal bridge were sold to a Hamilton foundry company for \$300.

Advices from Monse state 8,000 miners in the Boninage district have struck. Socialist leaders are fomenting discontent among the men.

Archbishop Fabre will leave Montreal on Wednesday for Rome, it is supposed in connection with the Laval-Victoria amalgamation question.

As the Archdiocese of Montreal is the second largest on the continent, coming after New York, it is expected that a sub-division will be decided upon.

On Thursday Archbishop Cleary, of Kingston, received from the Pope the apostolic letter confirming the appointment of Rev. Alex. Macdonnell as Bishop of the new See of Alexandria.

A bronze statue, representing a family of Abenaki Indians, and the work of M. Hebert, has just been received at Quebec from Paris. It is intended as an ornament for the former city.

The French and Italian Governments are anxious to establish an international marine service on the Red Sea, with the object of suppressing cholera. England's adhesion to the proposal is doubtful.

Thousand Island Park hotel was destroyed by fire early Thursday morning some of the guests narrowly escaping from the building with their lives and many losing most of their effects. The loss is estimated at \$150,000.

James F. Collicott, the real estate speculator of Winnipeg, and more recently of Toronto, was arrested in Boston Thursday charged with adultery and the abduction of Hattie Stephens, a sixteen-year-old girl, who accompanied him from Chicago.

Thursday afternoon a wild cat engine collided with a freight train on the Grand Trunk railway line, about two miles west of Cobourg. A general smash-up ensued. Joseph Woodcock, of Montreal, had his foot chopped off, and otherwise received severe injuries.

An afternoon performance of "Judah" was given in London Thursday for the benefit of the city clergy, who attended in large numbers upon the invitation of Mr. Willard, who desired to convince them that a well-conducted theatre is by no means a godless institution.

The Kingston regatta on Thursday was liveliest and most disastrous ever experienced there. A howling gale arose after the yachts started, and it created disaster, the Volante, of Hamilton, stranding at Point Frederick. The crew were saved. The Nora, Yama, Merle, Samoa, and Gerda stood out the gale, and came in victorious.
