Forestry.

To the Editor of the Jarvis Record:

SIR.—As your paper has previously taken an interest in the forestry movement I shall be obliged by your laying these few lines before your readers:—

The value of preserving a proper amount of forest throughout the country is now well known, and last spring, while travelling through several districts of Ontario, I saw much progress being made in tree planting both for shelter and ornament. I should have travelled through most of Ontario, but was prevented by an illness of some months duration. I should, therefore, be very glad if some of my old correspondents or others would take the trouble to send me a reply to the following questions, for use in my next forestry report, a copy of which will be sent to all who answer:—

(1). Whether and to what extent lines of trees for windbreaks or ornament are being planted, and how those planted are thriving.

(2). Whether plantations of young trees have been set out, and how they succeed.

(3). Whether cattle are fenced out from any portions of forest and how it answers.

(4). Any difference in climate, rainfall, drifting of snow and so forth you may have observed since the clearing of the country.

(5). What measures, if any, would be likely to improve the existing state of affairs. Yours truly,

Our Bad Roads.

Many of the common roads in this county are declared by travellers to be among the worst in the world, and they are becoming poorer every year in many parts of this and the adjoining counties. This may be accounted for to some extent from the fact that since the advent of railways but little attention comparatively has been given to wagon roads. Before that time farmers, merchants and manufacturers were all interested in having roads over which heavy loads could be hauled. They knew that good roads resulted in a great saving in wagons, harness and horseflesh. Besides it was an absolute necessity for keeping in repair the roads leading from one business centre to another. Property owners on the lines of these roads were anxious to have the roads kept in good condition. Since the country became gridironed with railways the wagon roads have received less attention, and in some places they have been neglected almost entirely. The tax raised to support them has been very small, and according to the statute labor system of doing business the work has been done by a kind of annual frolic amongst the boys, each striving to see how little work could be done. The older portion talk politics, and the younger ones crack jokes and tell stories. Very often the gravel pit is located a couple of miles from where the repairs are being done, and the majority of wagon boxes are so constructed that a respectable wheelbarrow load of dirt, sand and gravel is dumped on the road. Every fall and spring, as the mud roads become almost impassable, there is a great outcry among the farmers and the travelling community about the state of the roads. The Farmers' Institutes meet and pass resolutions in favor of having better roads. Last winter and spring nearly all the Institutes in Ontario took the matter up. Then the subject was referred to a special committee of the Ontario House. And this is generally the end of the whole thing. As soon as the spring rains are over and the ground becomes dry and settled all interest in the road ceases. During the late rains, places in some of the main county roads have been made almost impassable. All these bad roads are not only a hindrance to the proper carrying on of the farmer's business, but they are a great detriment to the business centres, the cities and towns. Just when merchants are looking for a steady business the

farmer is unable to market his produce except at a disadvantage, owing to the roads. There is a greater necessity at the present time to the manufacturer and the merchant than there was thirty years ago, for whilst we have been making a rapid advancement in well-constructed railways we have been going behind in systematic wagon road building to keep pace with the needs of the farmer, manufacturer and merchant.

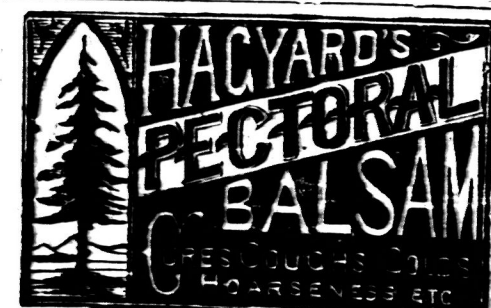
