

From this it appears that there exists a valuable market for poultry in Great Britain and the only questions to be answered. according to Buletin No. 1 issued by the Finance Department, Ottawa, are:-

1. Can our poultry be placed on the British market in good condition, and

2. Are the prices in Great Brit in sufficient to warrent a fair return for consignments sent?


In respect to the first question the Department is met with the fact that experimentally little is known as to whether and how poultry can be placed in good condition in great Britain. Canadian trade h s not heretofore run much in that direction, owing to other countries affording us a sufficient and ready market, and no reliable data can be gathered from experience on the part of Canadian shippers. To ascertain this several shipments are about to be made, the results of which will be carefully watched and reported, and the Government of Canada has now on the way to England an experienced shipper of eggs and poultry, who will make a thorough inquiry into the whole matter. His report will, if possible, be given to the Canadian public in time for the December shipments of poultry. The steamship companies are somewhat divided in opinion as to whether cold storage for poultry is needed from November until March. The Allan line has made shipments from Portland of fowls simply packed in boxes and barrels and if cold storage is found to be necessary, there is little doubt but that the steamship companies will provide it.

As to the second question, below will be found a summary of information collected by the High Commissioner in London, which will afford an index to the prices current in England about the middle of October, and the consequent

possibilities of a paying trade:-The quotations of prices in the Smithfield market for 18th October last, as given in the Mark Lane Express, are as follows.-Hen turkeys, 3s to 5s each; cock turkeys, 4s 6d to 7s 6d each; Surrey fowls, 2s 3d to 3s 3d each; Essex fowls, Is 9d to 2s 6d each; Boston fowls, Is 6d to 2s 6d each; Irish fowls, 1s 6d to 2s each; goslings, 4s 6 d to 7s each; ducklings, 2s to 3s 6d each,


