### The Empire's Prize Flag

The following essay written by  
Maggie Mowat of our Fifth Class suc-  
ceeded in carrying off the prize flag  
offered by the Toronto Empire for the  
best essay from the schools in the county  
of Haldimand on the subject upon which  
it is written. In addition to the flag  
which will be hoisted on Jarvis school  
on anniversary days the writer also  
receives one year's subscription to the  
Daily Empire:—

### THE PATRIOTIC INFLUENCE OF HOISTING THE FLAG ON THE SCHOOLS.

The Canadian Flag, while it is un-  
furled above many of our public build-  
ings, bearing on its majestic folds the  
crosses of St. George and St. Andrew  
and the arms of the several provinces  
of Canada, thus indicating the unity  
of the Empire and of the Dominion  
should also have a place on every school-  
house and institution of learning in the  
land.

Nothing is so essential to the welfare  
of a country as that the minds of its  
people be filled with lofty and noble  
patriotic sentiments. These should be  
instilled during the golden period of  
youth when character is being develop-  
ed and the mind is most susceptible to  
such impressions. At this stage of life  
perhaps nothing would have a greater  
influence in awakening the patriotic  
instinct than the appearance of the  
national flag "That braved a thousand  
years the battle and the breeze" upon  
our school houses on anniversaries of  
great victories achieved by the heroes  
of our country in the defence of our  
liberties and the honor of our flag.  
Such displays could not fail to remind  
us that we form a part of the greatest  
Empire in the world, one on which the  
sun never sets; one that has ever been  
foremost in the march of progress and  
civilization; ever ready to contend for  
civil and religious liberty, or to expose  
the cause of the weak and defenceless  
against the strong.

Around our national flag would  
cluster a wealth of memories as we  
would gaze upon it floating above our  
school house. Our thoughts would  
revert to Waterloo, to Trafalgar, to the  
Crimea, where marshalled under its  
ample folds our naval and military  
heroes have overcome the strongest of  
foes. We would be reminded of the  
great victory at Queenston Heights  
under our gallant hero, Sir Isaac Brock;  
and of the famous charge of the Light  
Bridges which so well reveals the cour-  
age of our race when "Cameron to the  
right of them, Cameron to the left of  
them, Volleyed and thundered, into the  
jaws of death rode the six hundred." Such  
reminders could not fail to inspire  
our breasts with noble and patriotic  
feelings, with earnest desires to  
emulate the deeds of those who  
have distinguished themselves in the  
service of their country; and with a  
determination that the future would  
always and us worthy sons and daugh-  
ters of those who have made our hearts  
thrill with admiration and reverence.

But apart from the hallowed associa-  
tions we share and the prestige we  
enjoy from our connections with the  
Mother Country, we have in this fair  
land a heritage of which we may  
well be proud, a country stretching  
from the Atlantic to the Pacific, great  
in possibilities that lie before it, and if  
given wise and good government, des-  
tined to become an important member  
of the British Empire.

If trained and nurtured in the atmos-  
phere which surrounds our flag with all  
its most sacred memories the rising  
generation of our country will be filled  
with patriotic sentiments; and if emer-  
gencies arise may be depended upon to  
respond nobly to Nelson's immortal  
watchword "England expects every  
man to do his duty." So to this end it  
is most desirable that the flag be hoisted  
upon our schools.

### Induction of Rev. Jos. Johnston.

The Rev. Joseph Johnston, formerly  
of Huron and Omagh, was inducted to  
the pastorate of the Presbyterian  
churches of Cayuga and Mount Healy  
by the Presbytery of Hamilton on Tues-  
day afternoon last. The Presbytery  
met in Cayuga church at two o'clock.  
There were present the Revs. Messrs.  
Wells, Jarvis, Shearer, Caledonia, Mc-  
Quarrie, Nelson, McKnight, Dunnville,  
and others, with whom was associated  
Rev. Mr. Kelly, Methodist minister,  
Cayuga. There was a large attendance  
the church being quite full. The Rev.  
Mr. Wells, Moderator, presided, and  
constituted the Presbytery with prayer.  
The usual intimation having been made  
at the door of the church that if there  
were any objections to the life and  
doctrine of the minister-elect, such ob-  
jections were now to be stated to the  
Presbytery, and no objections having  
been offered, the Rev. Mr. McQuarrie  
ascended the pulpit and delivered a  
most appropriate and practical dis-

course on "the assurance of eternal life."  
After the sermon the moderator briefly  
narrated the history of the congregation  
during the vacancy which had extend-  
ed over five years, and the steps that  
had been taken in the call to Mr. John-  
ston. Prayer having been offered, the  
Moderator gave Mr. Johnston the right  
hand of fellowship and formally induct-  
ed him as minister of the charge.  
Rev. Mr. Shearer then delivered a most  
solemn and impressive address to the  
new pastor. He was followed by Rev.  
Mr. McKnight, who addressed the people  
in suitable terms on the duties of the  
congregation to their minister.

After the induction the ladies of the  
church in Cayuga and Mt. Healy wel-  
comed all to tea from 5 to 7 p.m. in the  
basement of the Methodist church, which  
was placed at their disposal by the Rev.  
Mr. Kelly who has a way of endearing  
himself by his clever open-hearted genu-  
ine christianity. And such a tea—it  
was magnificent in its choiceness, deli-  
cacy and plenty.

At 7.30 the Presbyterian church was  
again crowded with an immense gather-  
ing of members and friends happy in  
the possession of their new minister.  
Mr. James Mitchell occupied the chair,  
wielding the baton of repartee with  
brilliant skill, as the speakers tried a  
full with him on susceptible points dur-  
ing the evening's amusement, and all  
went merrily as a marriage bell. Of  
the speakers, Mr. Colter spoke in good  
form, pleasantly, and in his soul-stirring  
words, of the influence of the church  
from a moral and political standpoint.  
Rev. Mr. Kelly followed in eulogistic  
strain on "general principles," and in his  
genial kindly way welcomed the  
new clergyman as a christian co-worker,  
a man and a citizen. Rev. Mr. Mc-  
Knight spoke very shortly of his good  
feeling from a personal standpoint.  
Mr. Goodman and the chairman then  
broke a lance in true knightly style,  
and to everybody's great delight, for  
dearly do all good folks like a laugh.  
Mr. Kinnear spoke agreeably of "the  
spur of the moment" and other incen-  
tives to action, being especially effective  
in confuting the idea that the church  
was losing hold, and in consequence the  
empire of which we are so proud already  
shows signs of decay. Rev. Mr. Wells  
at some length humorously described  
the starving out process, and hoped the  
present enthusiasm would long con-  
tinue. In the intervals the choir  
rendered exceptional music, being  
strengthened by the Falls Bros., of  
Jarvis. Then before closing the new  
minister was called upon and responded  
very nicely, appealing to good advan-  
tage.—Cayuga Advocate.

### Tenders for a License to cut tim- ber on Dominion Lands in the Province of Manitoba.

SEALED TENDERS addressed to the un-  
derdesigned, and marked on the envelope  
"Tender for Timber Berth No. 586," will be  
received at this Department until noon on  
Monday, the 5th day of January next, for a  
license to cut timber on Berth No. 586,  
situated on the H. E. River, a tributary of  
Lake Winnipeg on its eastern shore, in the  
Province of Manitoba, and containing an  
area of 24 square miles, more or less.

The regulations under which a license will  
be issued, together with a sketch showing  
approximately the position of the berth in  
question, may be obtained at this depart-  
ment or at the office of the Crown Timber  
Agent at Winnipeg.

Each tender must be accompanied by an  
accepted cheque on a chartered Bank in  
favor of the Deputy of the Minister of the  
Interior, for the amount of the bonus which  
the applicant is prepared to pay for the  
license.
