Sober and Loy should be silled, as the last wild boar and the last wolf in England were killed many years ago, or even that the number should be so summarriy reduced as that of the buffalo has been in North America within the last ten years. The land is occupied by men and cattle, and there is no chance for boars, woives or buffaloes to breed and live. But the ocean is not so occupied. As soon as seals become so scarce that it does not pay to fit out ships to hunt them, their number must remain stationary or increase.
