### The Hermit of Saltfleet.

An enterprising museum manager can find a first class freak in the county jail. He is a most remarkable creature: he can sing, dance and play on the bones, an can talk intelligently on every subject except religion. His hair hangs in chunks over his shoulders, not having been combed for over six years, and he is a terrible sight. His clothes are ragged and are liable to drop off him. His unkempt hair and long scraggy beard and ragged clothes give him a wild appearance.—Since September this strange being has been living in a swamp on Mr. Stewart's farm three miles back from Stoney Creek on the mountain. He built a hut for himself by placing two logs against a stump and covering them over with bark. The hut is protected from the wind and snow by the thick bush, but the old hermit fixed up a fire place to keep himself warm during the winter. For some time the farmers have complained about the man living in such an uncivilized manner, and this morning County Constable Springstead went out and arrested him. When the hermit was brought into court he told the magistrate that his name was Tommy Williams. He was afraid to take off his hat for fear his long hair would frighten the spectators.

"I am a tramp," said he. "I make my living by playing on the bone and singing. I am afraid some one will steal my bones from the sleigh. I came here in September. I am sixty years old, and have been tramping since 1875. I have not had my hair cut for ten years. I came from the Ottawa valley and have tramped to New Orleans and return. I am adverse to going to the poorhouse, and I don't like to be called a hermit."

"Are you married?"  
"No," said he, with a heavy sigh. "I was crossed in love. When I was in the States I used to be a great boy for the girls; but they were taken away from me. I had a hut in the marsh, and made \$17 dollars by singing. I am chuck full of music."

Williams objected to being convicted for vagrancy, but the magistrate sent him to jail for five months. It will break his heart to have his hair cut off. "I am a wandering minstrel," said he. The freak has a fair tenor voice, and sang Way Down in the Meadows, Bonnie Mary, and Wait till the Spring, Jennie, for the magistrate. He thought the P. M. looked like Bobbie Burns.—Hamilton Spectator.

### A Haldimand Farmer

ARRESTED AT FORT ERIE AND TRIED ON A VERY SERIOUS CHARGE.  
BUFFALO, Dec. 12.—"Gently, there gently, Miss Bailey," interrupted the prisoner in Magistrate Hill's court at Fort Erie, Ontario, at noon to-day. He spoke in chiding tones. The complaining witness, a girl of about 18 years, was telling her story. The prisoner was George W. Long, a black whiskered farmer of the township of Walpole, in the county of Haldimand, Ontario. The charge against him was a very serious one. From the girl's evidence it would appear that he wronged her, and that he afterwards administered to her a powerful drug. This occurred last March or April. The giving of the drug constituted the charge. Miss Bailey's full name is Frances Louise Bailey. She is one of the numerous bands of young English girls brought by Miss Rye to Canada from poverty stricken homes, and bound out to families for a term of years. Long is a typical Canadian farmer in appearance. He is about 35 years of age. His trousers were tucked into high rubber boots, his hands were seasoned and blackened with the labor of the farm. He is married and has four children, has a farm of 100 acres and is well to do. He pleaded not guilty to the charge against him, and elected that Magistrate Hill should not try him summarily, but should give him only a preliminary examination. He was arrested last night at the ferry by Officer Richard Griffin of the Ontario Police, who is stationed at Fort Erie, and was on the lookout for Long. He was at the time returning from a visit to the girl in this city, where he had been trying to make arrangements for placing her in a hospital. Magistrate Hill held Long for the spring assizes at Cayuga.—Empire
